AT WASHINGTON.

McKinley Creates an Alaskan Military Department.

UTAH POLYGAMOUS OFFICIALS. Special to the Guard.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—The recent charge made by Brigham H. Roberts that President McKinley had appointed federal officials in Utah known to be polygamists is to be investigated. The specific charges will come under the jurisdiction of the postmaster-general.

President McKinley today created the Alaskan military department, and immediate steps will be taken to place the new department on the active list, by sending soldiers to the northern territory.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 8.—Steamer advices from Honolulu state that on Jan. 1, seven more cases of the plague had occurred. The strictest sanitary measures are being carried out and no excitement is anticipated.

LONDON IN TEARS

More Heavy British Losses in Africa.

BULLER REPORTED TO BE ADVANCING. Special to the Guard.

LONDON, Jan. 8.—The Boer army attacked Ladysmith Sunday, but were repulsed after four hours of hard fighting. The losses on both sides are reported to be very heavy, and the work of both armies said to be brilliant exhibitions of bravery.

It is rumored that General Buller has at last succeeded in going through the Boer lines at Tugela river, captured twelve guns and is marching on to the relief of General White at Ladysmith.

At Magersfontein the British losses are said to be most severe, seven hundred of her majesty's soldiers having been mowed down by Boer leaden storms. All London is in distress at this wholesale slaughter of the pride of England's soldiery.

SEATTLE-TACOMA RAILWAY.

Work Begun on Trolley Line in Heart of Tacoma's Business Center.

TACOMA, Jan. 8.—Actual operations in the work of constructing an electric railway to Seattle, 25 miles in length, have commenced in this city. The Tacoma terminus is Eleventh street and Pacific avenue, the heart of the business center.
