Greater Activity Now Than for Several Years

Frank Hadley was in from Yound today, where he is conducting logging operations. He reports greater activity at the present time than has been exhibited for several years. Mr. Hadley has just put 300 logs in the stream and will quit operations until the June freshets. Morris Johnson, who has put 1,800 logs in will make a drive in February. Some logs have already been sent down and are now in the boom at Florence.

Lumbering prospects on the Siuslaw, Mr. Hadley states, are bright for the future. A new mill is being erected at Acme, which will be the third to be operated at that place. Many of the ranchers on the river are finding a market for their timber through these mills.
