BOER HUMOR

"NEW CENTURY" DEBATE RAGES IN LONDON.

The discussion in regard to the commencement of the twentieth century rages with unabated vigor in London. Following Emperor William's decision, Germany officially started the new century Monday, January 1. The Emperor's delusion on this point may be hereditary, for when, on January 1, 1850, the London Times had an editorial on the "commencement of the second half of the century," a discussion similar to the present one raged, and the emperor's grandfather, the prince consort, upheld the Times' contention.
