RAINBOW AT NIGHT.

Phenomenon Witnessed Not Long Ago by Residents of Lane County.

SPRINGFIELD, Or., Jan. 8.—(To the Oregonian)—I have failed to see in your paper an account of a rare phenomenon that occurred here recently, and which I called my daughter, Miss Jennie, out to witness also. We live in Springfield. At 5 a. m. Friday, December 15, 1899, two hours before daylight, I saw a perfect rainbow to the east, the full moon being in the west and shining through a rift in the clouds upon the gentle rain that was falling here, while in the east there was a dense cloud, as black as ink. It was on this that the bow was formed—a perfect bow, reaching from the earth on the north to the earth on the south, of full size, perfectly white. It lacked the brilliant light of the sun to bring out the other colors. I have never seen nor heard of anything like it, but I don't doubt that the like has been seen.

SCHOOL TAX LEVY.

Will Be Considerably Less Than Last Year.

(Section 21 General Laws of Oregon): The county courts of the several counties of this state are hereby required to levy, at the same time they levy other taxes, a tax upon all taxable property in their county, for school purposes, of five mills on the dollar, which shall be collected at the same time, in the same manner and by the same officer, that other taxes are collected.

It will be seen that this law fixes the levy for school purposes absolutely. This rate on the total taxable property gives a fund of \$26,794.70, which is \$6,080.07 less than last year, being a shortage per scholar of about \$1. All districts desiring or requiring as much money next year as received during the past year should immediately call a meeting and levy a special district tax, notifying the county clerk on or before February 1, 1900.
