THE CASCADE RANGE CLIMATE MODIFIER.

The Cascade range of mountains in Oregon and Washington, and their continuation on the south as the Sierra Madre, the eastern boundary of California, are responsible for wonderful climatic differences which occur in the space of comparatively a few miles. Cross the summit fairly and you are in a different climate on either side. The Grants Pass Courier well states the case:

Goose Lake is frozen over and skating parties are popular in Lake county. Geographically, this portion of the state is in Southern Oregon, being nearly in the center of the south line of the state, Lakeview, at the head of Goose Lake, is farther south than Grants Pass, and a little over 150 miles east of it in a straight line, though nearly twice that far by wagon road. It is one of the problems that inhabitants of the eastern states, how two localities so near each other can have such radically different climates, with so few points in common. In Southern Oregon, as the term is understood, meaning that portion of the state which lies between the Cascade and Coast ranges, on the south, there has been, virtually, no such thing as ice this winter and the two climates are about as near like each other as those of Michigan and Georgia.

DALLYING WITH NATURE.

Sometime since rainmakers attempted to draw moisture from the clouds by firing of explosives. Mr. Campbell, traffic manager of the O. R. & N. Co., will try an experiment in Eastern Oregon in the hope of accomplishing practically the same purpose. He explains his scheme to a Portland Telegram reporter:

While at Blalock I arranged with a couple of farmers to test the preservation of moisture in land by the use of salt. This is no new idea. It has been tried in the East. I shall salt the fields during different stages of the growth of the grain and keep an accurate account for publication, so that farmers desiring to use it may know how to go about it. These tests will show whether or not we can retain mois-

ture in the ground during the ripening season. I find it in Eastern Oregon the prevailing warm winds during the ripening season, damage crops.

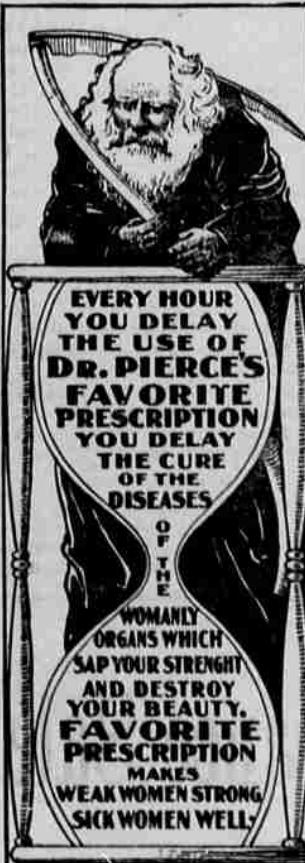
MAXIM GUN CIVILIZATION.

At the largest of them preference is given college graduates, and a thorough high-school education is essential for all candidates.
