## A HAIR-BREADTH ESCAPE.

Chris Cradlebaugh Swung Between Moving Passenger Coaches.

Spectators on the Southern Pacific railroad depot platform were treated to a sight that made them hold their breath for a few seconds, on the departure of the Oregon express train this afternoon.

Chris Cradlebaugh, a State University student, was taking the train for his home in Portland, when a couple of his fellow students attempted to detain him. He struggled to escape their clutches, and at last succeeded, though by that time the train was moving quite rapidly, and only one passenger coach remained. Cradlebaugh clutched the iron rail of the rear end of the next coach, but the motion of the rapidly moving train threw him between the ends of the two coaches, and there he remained suspended for a few seconds.

A broken opportunity put in an appearance almost at the instant, and drew Cradlebaugh from his perilous position onto the platform. Without help he could not have saved himself, and his hold on the slender iron rod could have been maintained but a short time. Only at one time will he be nearer death's door.

## THE TAX LEVY

Will Be Higher This Year on  
a Lower Valuation.

### SOME COMPARISONS.

On account of a general reduction in valuations as returned by the assessment rolls, amounting in the state to over \$13,000,000, tax levies will be higher this year than last, but the amount of money to be collected generally will be less, making the burden somewhat less on the taxpayers. The state tax levy is 6.3 mills, which, upon a valuation of \$120,282,879, will raise \$757,782.13. Last year the tax was 5.7 mills, and upon taxable property valued at \$133,533,577, the sum of \$761,143.39 was raised.

### LANE COUNTY.

Last year Lane county paid to the state \$35,963.89 for taxes. This year it will pay \$33,761.32, or \$2,202.57 less. The total taxable property of the county last year was \$6,309,440. This year it is \$5,358,940, or nearly a million less. The amount on the original roll for collection of '98 taxes was \$150,768.39, and for the '99 taxes will approximate nearly the same amount, according to the estimates of expenses now being completed by Judge Potter and Commissioners Bailey and Edwards, who will make the levy Monday.
