HEAVY RAINS.

The Willamette and McKenzie Rivers on the Moon.

The continued heavy rains of the past 48 hours have resulted in a decided rise in the rivers of this section. The Willamette raised rapidly yesterday afternoon and last night, standing 14 1/2 feet at 9 o'clock this morning. At 3 this afternoon it was 15 1/2 feet and slowly going up. The river bottom between Eugene and Springfield is impassable, but no difficulty is experienced north until the McKenzie river bottom is reached, where it is reported teams can not get to the bridge from this side.

In Eugene the rains have been so incessant and heavy that much water is standing on the ground, the sewers being unable to carry it off fast enough. Owing to a limited amount of snow in the mountains a flood is not anticipated and the water will not likely reach the high stage it did a few weeks ago—19 feet.
