Citizens are especially asked to come prepared to discuss briefly whatever of the above topics appeals most to them. The object of the union is to promote the cause of education in Eugene, and it is believed that free and full discussion, with both sides of each question fairly set forth, will do much to inform our people of the condition of our schools, and the result in action that will bring the "greatest good to the greatest number."

All those who have copies of the "School Laws" should bring them along in order to follow intelligently the address of Dr. Kuykendall.

The special music provided for the occasion will be an inviting part of the program, as these gentlemen are well known musicians, and will appear in quartet for the first time in public.

The meeting will be called to order promptly at 7:30 by the president of the union, Judge E. O. Potter.
