IN ALBANY.

Hugh Patterson Here and Declares His Innocence.

Albany Democrat of Monday.

Hugh Patterson, of this city, who has been accused of being implicated in the Thorne case, of Cottage Grove, about which so much has been said, is in Albany, at his father's home, and is not trying to flee as has been reported. He declares his innocence in the matter, and his story is undoubtedly straight, leaving no doubt that if there was a crime committed against the girl, it was by some one else. When the train stopped to wood up before reaching Latham, a young woman was seen by the track passing along. At Rice Hill, passing along the train, Hugh saw a parson in a cattle car and upon investigation found a young woman there, the Thorne girl. He notified the other brakeman and the conductor, and the girl was afterwards induced to go into the caboose, where it was warmer. At Roseburg, the car was not locked as reported. He never saw a thing to indicate any ill-treatment of her, nor knew of anything. When the train returned past Cottage Grove he saw a big crowd and learned what was the cause, naturally he was frightened and when the train reached Comstock got off and caught the first freight for Albany, which he reached Saturday morning. Mr. George Patterson, father of the young man, who has borne a splendid character here for many years, says there is not the least doubt of Hugh's innocence of the charges.

LUCKY BOY MINE.Second Clean-up From the Blue
River Mill Brought Down.

RESULTS ARE SATISFACTORY.

F. C. Sharkey arrived down last evening from the Lucky Boy Mine, Blue River, bringing with him the results of the second clean-up. Mr. Sharkey went to Portland on the 1306 day light overland on matters of business for the company, and will return in a few days to personally attend matters connected with the operation of the property.

"Results so far are satisfactory," Mr. Sharkey stated to a GUARD reporter. "You may say we have met with the success anticipated, so far as present returns indicate. We have spent many thousands of dollars in Lane county in developing these mines, erecting the mill and building roads, and we believe our confidence in the property has not been misplaced. The expenditure of large sums of money is necessary before anything can be taken from mines, therefore it is not a poor man's business, but with the active use of capital in mining the employment given laborers is of inestimable value. "If weather conditions are favorable we shall keep the mill running all winter, as every prospect warrants its steady operation."

PATTERSON FOUND.

Was Arrested at Albany and Taken to Cottage Grove.

Hugh Patterson, the S. P. brakeman, charged jointly with B. F. Harvey, another brakeman, in abducting Miss Winnie Thorne, a 15-year-old Cottage Grove girl for purposes of concubinage, was arrested last night at the home of his parents at Albany. Sheriff Withers went down this morning to get Patterson and took him to Cottage Grove this afternoon. Patterson strongly asserts that he is innocent, and that if the girl was assaulted he was not instrumental in the matter. District Attorney Geo. M. Brown, who was returning from Salem where he appeared before the supreme court, stopped off at Cottage Grove this afternoon and will assist his deputy, L. T. Harris, in the examination. L. Blyen, of this city, will appear for Patterson.

EXAMINATION OF HARVEY.

The following account of the preliminary examination of B. F. Harvey, heard yesterday, appears in a dispatch yesterday:

COTTAGE GROVE, Or., Jan. 15.—Squire Vaughan's court was packed today by those interested and curious to hear the preliminary examination of B. F. Harvey, the brakeman who was placed under \$500 bonds last Saturday upon the charge of rape upon the person of Miss Winnie Thorne. Deputy Prosecuting Attorney L. T. Harris appeared for the state and Attorneys A. C. Woodcock and J. S. Medley for the defense. Miss Thorne, the victim of the dastardly crime, was the first witness on the stand. She is a modest looking girl of less than 16 years, and from the first created a favorable impression, telling her story in a straightforward manner. Only once or twice during the recital of her pitiful story did she hesitate, and then apparently from an aversion to alluding to the disgraceful affair. The defense failed to break down her evidence on cross-examination, and when she was asked why she did not resist and cry for help, stated that Patterson and Harvey, who she alleged forced her upon the car, threatened her life.

The examination of the witnesses took up the greater part of the day. The argument was strong on both sides, and consumed about two hours, the case resting with Judge Vaughan about 5 o'clock, who announced he would hold the defendant to appear before the circuit judge of Lane county at the next term of court, in the sum of \$1000 bonds. Harvey expects Junction people to arrive on tomorrow morning's overland to fix his bond.

SAFELY IN JAIL.

This morning about 1:45 o'clock Policeman Croner, while in the rear of Peters' store, saw a man's head just for a moment, watching him from the woodshed in the rear of F. E. Dunn's store. He gave chase and two men ran to the rear of Link's shoe store, where the officer arrested them and placed them in the city jail. They claimed to be 'tramps and were looking for a place to sleep.

This forenoon Marshal Stiles made an examination of the premises in the rear of Mr. Dunn's and Mr. Link's stores. In the rear of the latter he found a crooked wire instrument on the ground, made to open locks, and with this they had unlocked the rear door of Mr. Dunn's store, but it was bolted, therefore they had not gained an entrance to the building when apprehended; a few feet away he also found a murderous looking 44 calibre Colt's pistol, fully loaded. He then went to the jail and made a thorough examination of the interior. He found in a newly purchased mattress two 10-inch files neatly secreted. They also had on their persons when arrested a large pruning knife and a razor.

Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Harris, who is at Cottage Grove, was telephoned to concerning the case and he said it would probably be Thursday before he could return here. Therefore the men were taken before Recorder Dorris this afternoon and were given five days on the charge of vagrancy. When Mr. Harris returns, a charge of attempted burglary will probably be booked against them.

These men are evidently old hands at the business, as green men would not have thrown away their gun. Burglaries have been prevalent down the valley for several weeks. Only a vigilant officer prevented them from burglarizing the store.

The two men were known to have two revolvers and only one was found. Anyone purchasing a revolver from two strangers yesterday, or having one offered them will confer a favor by calling on Chief of Police J. S. Stiles.

TAX LEVYLane County Court Fixes the
Rate at 23.5 Mills.

SCHOOLS SUFFER TO BENEFIT COUNTY

County Judge E. O. Potter and Commissioners W. T. Bailey and H. D. Edwards, at a special session held last night fixed the levy for the collection of 1899 taxes at 23.5 mills, apportioned as follows:

This year a 20 per cent reduction was made in real estate and improvement assessments, which makes the higher rate of the levy this year practically a lower rate than last year. In other words, based on the same valuation the 23.5 mills of this year amounts to 18.8 mills on the basis of the 20 mills levied last year. But in this the county is the gainer in income \$6,701.39, while the schools lose \$6,000.97 or approximately \$1 per scholar, and Lane county pays to the state \$2,302.67 less than last year. Of the 1898 levy, 3 mills for county and 1.3 mills for court house, a total of 9.3 mills brought to Lane county \$58,677.79, while for the 1899 levy, 8 mills for county, 2 for court house and 2.2 for roads and rock crushers will bring in \$65,379.18. While taxpayers on real estate pay \$1.50 less on each \$1000 of taxable property the county will have an added income of nearly \$7000, which it may not need, and the schools lose \$6000 which they can ill afford to do without.

This statement is in substance, the effect to be produced by the levy of this year in contradistinction to that of last year.
