UNION IN MALHEUR COUNTY.

The Vale, Malheur county, Herald has the following encouraging account of good county government secured through a union of the reform forces.

The election of our county officers chosen from the populist and democratic parties, assisted by the silver republicans, has proved a success in Malheur county. It has been a boon to the taxpayers in more ways than one. With efficiency in the work of the various officers is comprised a conservative board of commissioners, whose efforts in curtailing the county indebtedness will not soon be forgotten. Instead of our county warrants selling at 50 cents and 65 cents on the dollar, as was noticeable under the old regime, now our warrants bring from 85 cents to 98 cents. Thanks to a fusion government. Fusion has rid the county of a favoritism that was so long in vogue, and supplemented an economical and judicious management that has met the approbation of every taxpayer in Malheur county.

With such conditions existing there will need but little effort to rally the democratic and populist parties under one banner this year, which will be heartily endorsed by all friends of good government.

OUR BEST CUSTOMER.

The gentlemen who are continually waging mouth and pen and ink contests against Great Britain should study the recent exhaustive report of the chief of the foreign markets division of the Agricultural department at Washington.

The period covered is 1894 to 1898. The statement shows that the agricultural products exported from the United States in the five years had an average annual value of \$663,538,201. Of these enormous exports, about 60 per cent found a market in the United Kingdom and its various dependencies. The sum paid by the British people for the American farm products purchased during the period mentioned reached as high as \$403,953,954 a year. Great Britain alone took more than one half of all our agricultural exports, the consignments credited to that country forming about 55 per cent of the total shipments having an annual value of \$362,407,701.

Considering these figures our past difficulties with the old coun-

try should not be harbored in vengeance. It is considered that we have got the better of the performance.

AN UNAPPRECIATED ANIMAL.

Despised or illy thought of as it is, the mule really merits a deal of consideration these days, from the commercial standpoint. It is a fact that the demand for this animal is growing faster than the supply, and the consequence is a steady advance in its price. This is due to a certain extent to a better understanding of the real value of the mule as a worker, and also to the improved breeding of the animal itself.

It is larger, stronger and better looking than the old-time mule, and seems to be getting more civilized, too, or a better behaved fellow, which is doubtless due to better treatment than was formerly given him. Another reason for the good demand is that the American mule is highly regarded by outside buyers, hence the foreign demand is good.

Another champion of the doctrine of greed has his tire punctured, says the Roseburg Review. Erastus Wiman is a bankrupt and will pay his creditors about half a cent on the dollar, says an exchange. Not long ago he wrote a book on "How to Succeed in Business." He posed as a model of commercial virtue and success. He eulogized the advantage of a grab-as-grab-can system of business; and now he offers his creditors \$3,380 to satisfy claims of \$913,000.

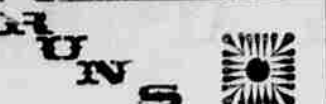
