Large Insurgent Force Has Been Defeated.

LAST BIG ORGANIZATION.

MANILA, Jan. 25.—General Schwan has completely dissipated the last large insurgent force on the island of Luzon, at Laguna Debay. His forces suffered little loss, while the Filipinos are said to have suffered severely in loss of life.

H. A. BARR

Writes an Interesting Letter From Dawson.

GIVES MUCH INFORMATION.

M. S. Hubble is in receipt of a letter from Hugh A. Barr, of Dawson City, N. W. T., bearing date of January 2, 1900, which is interesting in many particulars and gives mention to many well-known Lane county people. He says in part:

"J. D. Matlock and family are nicely situated in Dawson. They have a store full of choice merchandise and appear to be doing well. Mr. Workman, of the Stuehler, is working on a bench claim on Lovett gulch. Jacob Klein is in the employ of Dr. Thompson on one of his claims on Gold Run. He is well and as hearty as ever. Jake Neusbaum is working on Hunker creek. Clarence Adams is working for me."

Mr. Barr says that wages this winter is \$5 per day for laborers and \$10 for engineers. About 100 dog teams and 250 men expected to leave the middle of this month for Nome, a distance of 2000 miles, and it is expected 3000 people will leave the vicinity of Dawson for Nome during the season. Mr. Barr is very bitter in his denunciation of dominion regulations for mining men, and asserts that either results will be kept from the royalty officers or the district will be virtually abandoned. Fuel is one of the greatest troubles to contend with. There will be enough for this season, but after that it will be very scarce. With the introduction of steam thaws much more work can be done now than formerly, and Mr. Barr expects a larger output this year than ever before. Wood is now selling for \$20 per cord and very little offered for that.

"This district is at present writhing in the throes of official death. After much prospecting under the greatest of difficulties, by men who are least able to do so, Indian river and tributaries (all but a few claims) has been granted to concessions from Ottawa for a mere pittance. All the government fractions (\$7) on Dominion have been sold in Ottawa for an amount less than one of the claims went for one year ago in Dawson. On the Klondike and tributaries no more locations will be received, and after the 14th of last December unrepresented claims cannot be located as before. Attempts are being made to muzzle the press to keep the public from learning these schemes, and the editor of the Sunday Gleaner, S. W. Semple, was recently fined \$185 for contempt, and not allowed to go over to the bank to get the money, but was placed in jail while one of the officers was sent after the amount."

A "DRY" TOWN.—Ashland is having an interesting time with the saloon question. A remonstrance against granting any saloon licenses, signed by 215 legal voters and 241 women, was presented to the council meeting Monday evening. The highest number of votes polled at any city election was 407. Four applications for renewal of license were before the council, but each lacked the requisite number of legal signatures, according to an ordinance previously passed, and the licenses were not granted. The matter was held open for further examination, however. Two of the saloons which failed to obtain license have closed and the others keep open, but it is said, do not sell liquor. If all saloon licenses shall be refused an extra tax levy of 50 mills on property will be necessary. There is a disposition to raise the license fee from \$400 to \$600 or \$800.

Hops.—Salem Statesman: "The hop situation, locally, presents a more hopeful aspect than prevailed a week ago. Dealers have many orders but find difficulty in filling them, there being a disposition on the part of the growers to hold for better prices, the prevailing quotations being from 5 to 6 cents. Generally speaking, growers have refrained from disposing of their crop at present prices, which, it is claimed, will establish a more firm market and probably result in an advance in quotations."

ORCHARD GRASS.—J. F. Imboden, of Elmira, brought to the GUARD office today a bunch of orchard grass which is about ripe enough to cut for hay. It was grown in his field this winter. Such fine looking grass is seldom seen at this time of the year.
