A Five-Mill Tax Voted for the Coming Year.

WILL ADD ANOTHER GRADE.

The school meeting at the court house last evening was well attended, several ladies being present.

DIRECTORS' REPORT.

To the Citizens and Tax Payers of School District No. 4, Lane County, Oregon—

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:—As by law required, we herewith submit our annual report of the district, together with the changes and improvements made during the year; also an estimate of what, in our judgment will be necessary to maintain the schools for the coming year.

In accordance with the vote at last annual meeting, we re-seated the Central building at a cost of \$1200, painted the Geary building at a cost of \$250, connected Central with sewer, putting in flush closets, at a cost of \$165; also repaired blackboards in both buildings, and put in new boards in High school building costing about \$57, making a total for seats and repairs \$1678. Upon examination of roof on Central building we found that with little expense it could be made to do for two or three years to come. We also failed to paint the Central on account of the scarcity of funds. This, with some other improvements might have been made by borrowing the \$500 authorized at last annual meeting, but we decided it best not to increase the indebtedness of the district.

The \$4000 indebtedness we have funded at 6 per cent interest, instead of 8 per cent as heretofore.

On account of the lower valuation of all real estate and improvements in the district, there will be between \$1200 and \$1300 less from the county fund than last year, while the special tax will be upon the same low valuation. We have, therefore, had to ask for 4 mills instead of 3 to make good this deficiency.

With this additional tax it will not be possible to make any improvements or add any additional grades to the High school, as many think necessary.

The High school occupies the old courthouse, which we have leased at \$10 per month, or \$120 per year. This lease is for one year, with a privilege of three years. While this is not all that could be desired, either as to building or location, yet it was the best we could do, and we are of the opinion it is best to continue the use of this building for this purpose until the district is in better condition financially than at present.

The schools are quite destitute of apparatus, nothing of this character having been purchased for several years excepting a few articles for the primary grades. There ought to be expended \$100 or \$150 for globes, charts, etc., to bring our schools up to the efficiency of other schools throughout the state.

After a careful estimate of the revenues likely to be derived from the various funds, considering the lower valuation of all real estate and improvements within the district, we are of the opinion that nothing less than 4 mills will maintain the schools as now conducted, and if any improvements are desired, or any reduction of present indebtedness made, it will need a 5-mill tax.

show another teacher will be needed by next year.

It was the general desire that another grade, the twelfth, be added. Three graduates from the public schools will be admitted to the University.

Speeches were made by G. B. Dorris, S. H. Friendly, L. Bilyeu, H. B. Miller and Professor Condon, favoring a 5-mill tax, and the same carried unanimously.

The service closed with a short address in Chinese by the pastor of the mission, after which light refreshments were served.

The groom, a graduate of the Bishop Scott academy, is a fine young man in every respect, and has the good wishes of a host of friends.
