WITH THE DEMOCRATS

County Central Committee Meeting Today.

ROUTINE BUSINESS TRANSACTED.

The meeting of the Lane County Democratic Central Committee was called together at the courthouse at 1 p. m. today, Hon. J. J. Walton; chairman, and L. L. Stevens, secretary.

On roll-call it was found that 25 precinct committee-men were present.

The chairman announced that the business before the committee was to fill in vacancies and attend to other business incident to the opening of the coming campaign.

Hon. R. M. Veatch, of Cottage Grove, addressed the meeting in a brief explanation of the present political conditions and demands.

Mr. Harlan, editor of the Pacific Democrat, J. M. Kitcher, Geo. A. Dorris, L. Blyen, C. M. Kissenger, and others made enthusiastic talks in favor of an open and aggressive campaign.

"That man," said Mr. Veatch, "who is opposed to the principles of Mark Hanna as carried out by President McKinley, and the gold standard adherents, whether he has been democrat, populist or silver republican, that man I call a good democrat." Continuing further Mr. Veatch said that the man who is in a party record with the Chicago platform and opposed to the present administration could join issues with the democratic party in an earnest effort of principle to bring about reform. This sentiment appeared to be virtually the unanimous wish of the membership present.

A committee consisting of R. M. Veatch, C. M. Kissenger and J. M. Kitcher was appointed to prepare resolutions embodying the principles to be maintained regarding the management of the coming campaign.

On motion Chairman Walton was empowered to fill all vacancies in the central committee.

On motion each precinct committee-man is instructed to act as chairman of committees in his precinct with power to appoint other members to assist in registering names.

ROBBERY AT JUNCTION.

F. W. A. Crain's store loses \$1500 Worth of Jewelry.

MORE DETAILS.

Special to the Guard. Junction, Jan. 27.—The jewelry store of F. W. A. Crain was robbed yesterday evening between the hours of 5 and 6 o'clock while Mr. Crain and brother, Horace, were at supper.

A light was burning, and as the parties entered through the back door, they were not detected. They have taken about sixty watches estimated at an average value of \$20 each, thirty of which belonged to customers, and from sixty-five to seventy gold rings, prices ranging from \$1 to \$7 each, and a miscellaneous lot of other jewelry, which is hard to estimate the value of.

The total loss will probably reach from \$1200 to \$1500. No clue to the robbers has so far been obtained.

The burglary of F. W. A. Crain's jewelry store at Junction last night proves to have been much larger than first reported. When the Eugene officers were informed of the affair early in the evening it was stated watches to the value of \$300 were taken. According to a report brought up today by J. T. Clow the loss is estimated at \$1200.

The robbers took every watch in the building, good, bad and indifferent and all those left with Mr. Crain to be repaired. In addition to this they took a quantity of silverware the value of which is considerable.

The burglars entered the store by prying open the back door while Horace Crain, brother of the proprietor, was absent for supper, about 6:30 o'clock, and did their work so rapidly that when Mr. Crain returned the store looked like a Kansas cyclone had struck it. Horace Crain sleeps in the store and the burglars must have known this fact as the only time when no person is in the building is when he is absent for his meals. The general opinion at Junction is that local talent is responsible for this burglary as well as a number of others which have occurred in that town in the past few months.

When the Eugene officers were notified, Sheriff Withers and Marshal Stiles went down the railroad track about a mile from Eugene and remained all night but accomplished nothing beside scaring a poor hobo who came along about 2 o'clock. When they held the hobo up to search him "Weary" thought his last day had come, and, placing his hands on his breast repeated, "Now I lay me down," etc. The officers state last night was very cold. Nightwatchmen Croser and Hawk searched the south-bound trains, at Eugene so that it is evident the burglars did not come this way.

Mr. Crain can ill afford to lose this amount of goods and for his sake, as well as trying to break up a gang of burglars, which evidently has headquarters in Junction, it is hoped the officers will be successful in capturing the men.

The council has also decided to compel a poll road tax to be worked by all entitled to. This will amount to one day's work or \$1.50. This was not enacted last year. Of course firemen, members national guard and men over age are not compelled to work this.

It is estimated that the expenses of the city can be met with the above tax by strict economy, without increasing the debt, if no extraordinary expense is incurred.

THIRTY SIX MILLS.

The citizens of Eugene will be compelled to "dig up" 36 mills this year for taxes, apportioned as follows:
