A few weeks before his death Mr. Burbee's dues in the lodge of which he was a member, fell in arrears. A friend noted the fact, and made it known to several of the members. Among them they raised the amount necessary to place their brother in good standing. Scarcely had this charitable work been done when Burbee rode into the swollen slough from which the body was subsequently recovered. The husband and father was gone; the hand that had been the support of the wife and children was nerveless. But the fraternal spirit of the A. O. U. W. had done its work.

BLUE RIVER

Reported That the Lucky Boy Co. is Cleaning Up \$250 Per Day.

MORE APPARATUS NEEDED.

OREGON CITY, Jan. 27.—W. L. Becker, who is extensively interested in the Blue River mines, returned from there last night, and reports the camp booming. He was informed that the Lucky Boy Company was cleaning up \$250 per day, and it was believed that it was losing that much more in the concentrates. However it expects to have apparatus in place within a week or two that will save the concentrates. The Brownsville Company has begun a survey for a wagon road up the Calapooia river from that place. Mr. Becker and his partner, J. E. McCauley, of Portland, expect to run long tunnels into their claims at an early date, one on the Calapooia side of the mountain and one on the Blue river slope.

LOWER SIUSLAW ACCIDENT.

Log Rolled on and Killed a Four Year Old Boy.

Florence West January 26.

A terrible accident occurred about ten o'clock Sunday morning, January 21st, 1900, at the home of Andrew Hartley on Maple creek, Douglas county, about six miles southeast of Florence, by which Arthur, the four-year-old son of Mr. Hartley, lost his life instantly.

The boy was playing around while his father was at work on a hillside sawing a log. Just as the saw cut through, the boy climbed up on the log, when it started to roll, throwing him to the ground below and passing over his head stopped across his breast. Mr. Hartley dug away the earth and took the boy out from underneath the log as quickly as he could, but life was extinct, the weight of the log, some fifteen inches in diameter and twelve feet long, having caused instant death.

Cottage Grove Fire Limits.

COTTAGE GROVE, Or., Jan. 28.—A strong fight is being made to the city council to have the fire limits abolished in East Cottage Grove, which covers eight blocks. This ordinance was adopted by the old Lemath council, and was approved by the Cottage Grove council when the towns were consolidated. It has prevented many wooden buildings from being erected in the past two years. The council is equally divided on the question, three for and three against, and the deciding vote will be left to Mayor Bristow, and it is believed he will cast his vote to sustain the fire limits. Three fourths of the business men will fight to the end to have the limits remain as they are, profiting by the experience of other towns. The agitation has arisen from men of limited means desirous of engaging in business and not having sufficient funds to construct brick buildings.
