WARREN'S DEFEAT ASTOUNDS ENGLAND.

LONDON, January 29.—A terrible gloom has settled over England since the defeat and terrible loss of Warren's command at the hands of the Boers.

General Dundonald's forces are reported in safety south of the Tugela river.

Lisbon advices deny that the Boers have invaded Mozambique.

LADYSMITH MUST SURRENDER.

LONDON, January 29.—All hope of relieving Ladysmith has been abandoned. Lord Roberts has advised the abandonment of further attempts to relieve the beleaguered British forces. It is thought that the surrender of the British forces in that place cannot long be delayed, especially when all hope of outside succor has vanished.

London Life.

One of the most picturesque scenes in the new drama, "London Life," which will be presented at The Parker opera house Wednesday evening, January 31, is a graphic reproduction of that celebrated English thoroughfare, Fleet street. Every school boy has read about Fleet street and the immortal geniuses who made its precincts famous in their own days and forever afterward. Every stone of the street seems reminiscent of the great Dr. Johnson and his beloved conferees, the erratic Goldsmith. Once they fought a duel. It was years before they became firm and fast friends. Goldsmith met Dr. Johnson at a coffee house and presently they fell to disputing over some literary topic of the day. Oliver had one opinion and the Great Samuel had another. The dispute ended in a challenge. They met on the field of honor, near Windsor, one chilly morning. The two principals paced nervously up and down to keep warm, while their fire-eating seconds debated the conditions of the duel. Presently there were loud words, oaths and blows. The seconds were fighting hammer and tongs.

"Let us separate our seconds," said Goldsmith, with his homeric laugh. The phrase became historic. The duel ended in a breakfast at the Mermaid tavern.
