BUBONIC PLAGUE.

Raging Among the Chinese and Sandwich Islands.

A late Honolulu letter informs the Portland Telegram that the bubonic plague is raging in the Sandwich Islands. The letter states that all of the theaters, churches, schools and many of the stores are closed. The city is demoralized, and scarcely any business is being transacted. Communication with the adjacent islands is meager, and the reports received from them say that the plague is raging. Honolulu is in quarantine, and tons of disinfectant are being used.

As the chief hot-bed of the disease is in the Chinese quarter, entire blocks of buildings in that section are being destroyed by fire. By such heroic means the health officers hope to stamp out the dread disease. The people, however, do not rely upon the methods of the authorities entirely for safety, and are flying to the hills of the interior. These refugees have purchased provisions for a siege of six months, and a proportional amount of disinfectants and medicines.

The contention is made that the whites on the islands are not in great danger, for the reason that they do not eat raw food, as do the Chinese and Kanakas. Raw devil fish and similar foods are delicacies, and also staple diet on the bill of fare of the lower classes, and to this is attributed in a large degree, the exposure of such people to the ravages of the plague. The truth of this assertion has as yet neither been confirmed or denied, but is the principal argument used to account for the small number of deaths among the white population and the heavy mortality in the ranks of the Kanakas, Japanese and Mongolians on the islands.

There is only one steamer which is advertising to take passengers, and there are more booked now than the vessel can carry. Everybody is anxious to leave the infected place, and when the steamer leaves a rush is expected that can only be likened to the stampede for life rafts when a ship is sinking.

The recipient of the letter found that the envelope had been out at each corner, which was done by the postal authorities, for mail coming from the plague-ridden port is fumigated and disinfected before being forwarded.

Salem Postoffice Site.

Salem, January 29. Mayor Bishop this morning received a letter from U. S. Attorney John Hall, of Portland, saying that he had received from Washington the check for \$7500 in favor of the city of Salem in payment for the Wilson avenue postoffice site. Attorney Hall requested that the abstract be brought up to date and the deeds signed and recorded, and all the records put in order.

When this work is completed, Mr. Hall will be notified, and within a few days the whole deal will be completed. Uncle Sam will have his block of land, and the city will have its money. Then the city will deposit in the bank of Ladd & Bush to their credit the respective amounts due the three Wilson heirs, Mrs. Frances A. Gill, of Portland, Mrs. Kate L. Dillingham, Bangor, Maine, and Mrs. Laura Belle Wythe, of Oakland, Calif.
