CHICKENS COMING HOME TO ROOST.

The extortionate advance in the price of news and other papers through formation of trusts is bringing even Pennsylvania thick and thin protection newspaper men to a realization of the inequities of trusts as the possibility of benefits to be derived from lower duties in dealing with the legitimate off-spring of a high protective tariff. The trust advance of paper costs the Oregonian about twenty-five dollars a ton extra, no small item, and it took occasion the other day to place itself on record as to the more than highway robbery. Here is the comment:

The Pennsylvania Editorial Association has been so affected by the dealings of its members with the paper trust that at its annual meeting in Harrisburg, on Tuesday, it adopted a resolution declaring that "if trusts are honestly organized to reduce expenses and consequently the cost of products, they should depend on their own business sagacity, and not upon protection given to them by the government," and appealing to congress to "repeal such tariff duties as seem to protect the trusts in Pennsylvania is sufficient to stamp the utterance of profound national significance in tariff discussion.

The protective tariff has been robbing other people a long time, but the Oregonian has never made an earnest protest until pinched itself.

ANTIPODES MEET.

One of the oddest meetings ever held assembled in Indianapolis, Ind., the other day, on the joint call of the Anti-Saloon League, and the State Liquor Dealers Association, in the Meridian street M. E. church. The purpose of the meeting was to devise means to compel persons who are selling liquor under the government license of \$25, to take out city and state licenses. In Indiana the liquor license money is turned into the school fund and it was shown that hundreds of persons were selling without having taken out these licenses.

Dr. Callen, secretary of the saloon keepers league, made the principal address, and E. F. Ritter, the most prominent prohibitionist in the state, presided. Between the two some plans were agreed upon which will probably bring the license dodgers to time.

The St. Louis Journal of Agriculture says: Speaking of the gun that was supposed to be unloaded, it is frequently the gentle bull that is a menace to the life and limbs of those who handle him and he is certain to transmit his vices to his progeny. It is a safe practice to distrust every bull, even though he may be reputed to possess a most quiet disposition. It is nearly always the quiet animal that does the damage, because he is unsuspected, but when an animal is known to be vicious, it is taking long chances to trust him.

The Jacksonville Times inferentially indorses lynching in extreme cases like that of the Latham abduction and cruel outrage. The Times says:
H. Patterson and B. F. Harvey, railroad brakemen, have been held to answer to the charge of abducting and outraging Winnie Thorn, a girl who lives at Latham, Lane county, and is under 16 years of age. It is said to be a very bad case of human depravity. There is no punishment too severe for the perpetrators of such an act. They are usually lynched in the southern states.

Cleveland's comptroller of the currency comes to the defence of McKinley's secretary of the treasury. They are birds of a feather, and they support the same rotten currency system. Wall street owns them body and soul.

Bourke Cockran, the gifted Tammany orator, has got on the Bryan band wagon. He announces that he will support the Nebraskan for president even though free coinage of silver has a place in the platform.

A Clackamas county citizen is dead from the effects of a rattlesnake bite received east of the mountains several years since. The wound never healed.

There are four disappointed men in Portland. The quartet held up a citizen Sunday night and got ten cents and a small piece of tobacco.
