A Japanese Dinner.
He who does not like the way the Japanese cook dish must be hard to please. They are better than the French. The Japanese waters are very, very, and the natives seem to have learned in cooking to preserve the inherent flavor of the fish, while their sauces are very simple. And as for eels, as they are cooked at the kandagawa, a teahouse in Tokyo, he who has tasted them has established a standard in his mind by which to judge other eels.
Seaweed we had, too, thin as paper, and crisp. It is the weed of the sea that is left on the rocks and scraped from them by the fisher women with shells and then dried in the sun. It is eaten as a relish and has a delicate flavor, suggesting cinnamon.
Rice we had in abundance. It was served from a bucket not unlike ours, but not quite so deep of unpainted white pine, with a little wooden shovel somewhat like those our children use in playing at the seashore. Our rice bowls were filled again and yet again, and when we covered our bowls I meant we had finished dinner. I have seen the Japanese look with indifference at a dish cooked in a way that made my mouth fairly water with desire, but when they are served with rice it receives their immediate attention.—Harper's Magazine.

Napoleon Was a Dandy.
It is pleasant to learn, if one has Napoleon I on the hero list, that he had very dainty habits in personal matters; that he was fastidiously clean in his person, according to an article in a French contemporary, and poured eau de cologne into the water he washed in, then sponged his head with perfume and finally poured the remainder of the contents of the flask over the neck and shoulders. Saturday, January 28, by a rate of 384 to 72 the taxpayers of Baker City voted in favor of the issuance of \$100,000 bonds, to run twenty years and bearing four per cent interest, for the purpose of purchasing the Elk creek water rights, laying the best of modern pipe for the required distance of approximately 10 miles, and, in short for putting in a complete gravity water system for supplying Baker City for a generation to come with an abundance of pure mountain water, for general use, fire fighting and sewerage purposes.

The home of ex-Governor Penoyer at Portland has been levied upon to satisfy a judgment obtained against him for official acts while mayor of Portland. The amount is \$13,000, and the representatives of the city have taken no action to relieve Mr. Penoyer of the liability. The city has no money with which to pay the claim, and has no means at present of securing the same, so the creditor is proceeding against the ex-governor and mayor personally.
