COMMERCIAL COURT.

In the matter of indigent soldiers: J. W. Geary Post No 7, notified the court of their intention to relieve the indigent soldiers, widows and minor children of such soldiers and to defray the funeral expenses of same, as per act of legislature of the state of Oregon, passed in 1893.

A. C. Jennings files his bond in the sum of \$500 as commander of J. W. Geary Post with J. W. White and J. W. Whiteaker as sureties, as provided by law; ordered that said bond be and the same is hereby, in all things approved.

Now at this time the court entered into an agreement for keeping the county paupers for a term of two years from January 1, 1900, with B. F. Russell.

The contract provides that said B. F. Russell shall properly board, clothe, lodge and care for the paupers for two years from January 1, 1900, said care to include all washing, mending, medicine and medical attendance necessary for said paupers; he also agrees to furnish sufficient good, wholesome and proper food for said paupers and to furnish them clean and suitable clothing, and that he will at his own expense decently and properly bury all paupers who may die during the term of his contract. It is understood that all children two years old and under, consigned with their mothers as paupers shall be cared for free of all charges; all under 10 years, consigned to his care without their mothers, he shall receive \$2 per week; for all other paupers he is to receive \$3 per week, payment to be made in Lane county warrants. Dr. Russell is to have the services of all paupers able to work.

REMAINS OF OREGON DEAD

Caskets of the Volunteers Decorated at the Presidio.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 30.—Friends and relatives of the Second Oregon volunteers visited the Presidio this afternoon and decorated with violets, ferns and roses the caskets of the dead soldiers of the 1st regiment who were brought here from Manila on the transport a few days ago. The bodies are in hermetically sealed caskets, under guard, near the tenting ground where their comrades lately shivered in the fog and wind of the Presidio. If the remains are not called for they will be buried in the national cemetery here with military honors. WILL BE BROUGHT HOME.

The bodies of Walter Hawthorne and Charles Horn will be brought to Eugene for interment, the former being sent for by his parents, Professor and Mrs. B. J. Hawthorne, and the latter by the Lane County Veterans Association. As soon as the boys found that the body of Horn was unclaimed, they immediately communicated with Colonel Long at the Presidio and gave him instructions to send the body here. He replied by saying the sanitary conditions there were such that it would be several days before the bodies would be started. It is very probable that the bodies of both soldiers will be shipped together.
