SKIRMISH COMMANDERS NEEDED.

The British officers in South Africa have been marching their men up against Boer intrenchments "just as if on parade." The Britons could not see the enemy that rained a pitiless storm of lead upon them, but the officers had them march upright over fire zones swept by the best marksmen in the world. If an American officer sacrificed his men that way he would find a court-martial ready for him if he survived his first experiment of making a parade attack upon concealed shooters who never waste a shot.

This sort of inefficiency on the part of the officers has no doubt disorganized or "rattled" the soldiers. There are signs that the officers are quarreling among themselves and that the privates have a profound distrust of their leaders. Some of the orders given by British officers have resulted in the murder of their men, and the aristocrats who carry the commissions have proved themselves the most amateurish fighters of the age, whatever may be said in the praise of their personal bravery. They need commanders of the General Wheeler type or, better still, like that old Indian fighter General Crook. The devil must be fought with fire.

SLACHTER'S NEK AVENGED.

Dr. Vaught, author of Fifty Years of the Republic in South Africa, concludes his interesting article on "The Afriganders in Natal," in the February number of the North American Review, with the following:

"The largest army which England has ever had on the battlefield in South Africa—over 20,000 men, horse, foot and artillery, with powerful guns from British warships and with lyddite shells to help them—has been hurled back from the upper Tugela line, losing 2000 in killed, wounded and prisoners and also 11 guns. On the Tugela, where the fathers died in 1838, aye, and south of the Tugela, are the sons now, on the 10th day of December, 1899. They are there with Lucas Meyer; with Louis Botha, whose mother was in the larger on the Bushman's river in 1833, and with Schalk Burger, whose father was outlawed and proscribed by the British govern-

ment and went across Drakensberg in 1842.

"They stand on the Tugela, while in the background the great Drakensberg mountains, where the snow white everlasting glows, rear their topmost peaks above the clouds. The British general has asked for an armistice to bury his dead—on the 10th of December—to bury his dead in the very ground where rest some of the bones of the murdered Boer trekkers.

"'Avenge Majuba,' the crowds have shouted in London and at Durban and Cape Town. God has avenged Slachter's Nek instead."

The Federal quarantine officer of San Francisco is determined to take no chances on the black plague being brought into that port. He has issued instructions to the pilots that all vessels, steam or sail, arriving here from Kobe, Hong Kong, Sydney and Honolulu, must go into quarantine pending an examination. The pilots have been instructed to fly a yellow flag on all vessels coming into the harbor from the ports named.

The editor of the Portland Telegram is of the practical sort. That paper remarks: The 20th century question has nearly lapsed into oblivion, before the pressure of that more important question, to many people: When, if ever, will General Buller get to Ladysmith?

The later dispatches to the effect that the attempted assassination of Senator Goebel, of Kentucky, contesting candidate for governor, will not prove fatal is welcome news. Political assassinations shock the public mind as no other class of crimes.

Our churches need their missionaries at home instead of sending them abroad. Occurring events bring the state of Kentucky into prominent relief as a place where their civilizing and Christianizing influences are sadly needed.

The state board of horticulture announces that old orchards must be cleaned up. If they mean what they say positions on that board are not sinecures. They deserve the hearty co-operation of the public.
