State is Now Being Divided Into Precincts for Enumeration.

Portland Telegram, January 31.

C. H. McIsaac has been appointed to take charge of the census work of the district of Western Oregon, so far as the same relates to the public. The work that is now progressing is entirely in the way of preliminary arrangements. The state is being divided into precincts for enumeration, which is a task requiring considerable judgment. Communications are being sent out to county clerks and assessors, requesting copies of the precinct plans on which the enumeration of 10 years ago was based. The new county of Wheeler, in Eastern Oregon, has somewhat upset calculations, and the precincts must be established anew.

Assessors are being asked for lists of farms in the various counties, in order that requisition may be made for

blanks at the bureau in Washington.
