IN EARLY DAYS

An Old Pioneer of '38 Writes
Interestingly.

HE IS AT PUERTO RICO.

SAN JUAN, PUERTO RICO,
Jan. 15, 1900.EDITOR GUARD.—S. Handaker,
E-q., who is one of my best friends and
former fellow soldiers, has kindly fur-
nished me with the GUARD of Dec. 21,
containing "extracts" from my letter,
which convinces me that a little early
history of Lane county would not be
uninteresting.

EUGENE AS IT WAS.

The "extracts" make me say, "Jim
Huddleston's residence between the
bute and the river." That was in
1853, and in correcting this mistake I
would say, that Mr. Huddleston built
his residence later, and at that
time ran a little store—the best and
most extensive stock of merchandise
then in the county—in a little log
house north of the butte, he at that
time being a single man, and outside
of his store house and Mr. Skinner's
residence the town was "all on paper,"
for the county seat had just been
located there.

THE SURROUNDINGS.

Pryor Blair's residence, three-fourths
of a mile west of town, must have been
the next nearest dwelling. Then there
were scattering settlers near and skirt-
ing the river northward. The Davises,
the Maples, the Poindexters, the
Peaks, the Woodys etc. But that
fertile plain known in those days as
Grand Prairie, was destitute of inhab-
itants and covered with long waving
grass, while here and there it was
dotted with herds of long-horned cattle
or roaming cayuse ponies from the
above settlement until you reached the
Long Tom or Fern Ridge.

WEST AND SOUTH.

In the hills and near them, west of
town, lived the Mulkeys, the Baileys,
the Lukins, the Crabtree, the R. G.
dales and other prominent families of
the early times; while up the Coast
Fork there were settlements of equal
importance. But there were none of
more interest than those in the two
forks. Isaac Briggs and his son, Elias,
were engaged in farming and milling
where Springfield now stands. South-
west of this, in the upper forks, was
the famous Pleasant Hill settlement
with its sturdy, stable citizens, while
on both sides of the McKenzie were
flourishing neighborhoods. It will
therefore be seen at a glance, that Eu-
gene was wisely located, and conse-
quently has become the ideal city of
the upper Willamette.

THE SETTLERS.

There being neither city nor town in
the county (except on paper) therefore
none of that brick-a-brac and ginger-
bread in either house or dress; for
houses were generally constructed of
logs, and a clapboard shanty was a
luxury, while a painted house was a
landmark not to be found. As for
dress, a pair of breeches, a wool hat,
woolen pants and a hickory or woolen
shirt completed the summer toilet—
add to this a stake rope, a pair of cloth
or blanket leggings and a pair of high
spurs (roundometers), the gay and festive
young man (bachelor as they were all
called), was ready to call on his best
girl, or go to church.

GOING TO CHURCH.

It may be a mystery to those who
live in that same part, who now ride
in buggies and carriage, how we got
to church without those commodities.
Well, our meeting-place frequently was
a schoolhouse, private residence, grove,
barn or sawmill, and how we went
was just this way: If we did not have
a horse staked out on the grass, we
would walk all Sunday morning and
cover a distance of 10 miles and find
one to ride one-half mile to the meet-
ing, for the riding had to be done. Or
in case a crowd was to go, we hitched
a yoke of oxen to a lumber wagon that
had seen service on the plains. Indeed,
the ox team beat a naphtha or a sail
boat, for it never failed to land us at
the right place.

AT CHURCH.

The crude surroundings did not
interfere with the gravity of the
audience nor the eloquence of the
preacher, for they were used to crude
things, and the young as well as the
gray donned solemn countenances
under the "drippings of the sanctuary,"
even if they did steer clear of the
"amen corner," where the "veterans
of the Lord" sat, prompting the
fervent speaker, and a great many
"good meetings" were held. Yet, if a
well-dressed man found his way to
church he was a spotted bird, for the
whole congregation spotted him—his
dress was an innovation.

THE DANCE.

Many were inclined to the ball and
the dance, but what we have said in
relation to the costumes worn at
church and the manner of the con-
veyances thereto are so similar that a
description would not be interesting.
The cotillon was the favorite "figure,"
and was generally used.

EUGENE IMPROVED.

The town grew slowly at first but
made a greater stride later, for as house
after house was added to the group, its
interest was augmented, and it soon
had a good courthouse, schools and a
college, so that in 1855 when I saw it

last, it would have been a credit to any
new country.
