UNIVERSITY OF OREGON.

Recommendations of the Special Committee Adopted.

Oregonian, Feb. 8.

The board of regents of the University of Oregon held an adjourned meeting yesterday afternoon. The heavy debt that burdened the school last year has been entirely removed, and this, together with the added improvements and increased attendance, brings it closer to what it should be.

The following report of the special committee appointed Tuesday was read and adopted:

TO THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE STATE UNIVERSITY:—

Your committee to whom was referred the matter of the re-organization of the University and faculty, the appropriations to the law, medical and musical departments, creation of new departments and employment of additional instructors therefor, and the salary of the professor of music, as well as the proposition of the Eugene Water Company to furnish water for the University, beg leave to report:

1. We recommend that the former appropriations, to-wit: \$1000 to the medical department and \$600 to the law department of the University, be restored.

2. We recommend that no contract relating to the expenditure of the funds of the University be permitted or recognized unless the same be with the approval of the president of the University, and by the president of the board; that no accounts be run, or obligations of any character be incurred, except under the regulation of the president of the board and president of the University.

3. We recommend that two additional instructors, at salaries not exceeding \$1000 each per annum, be employed for the coming year, and that the president of the University be requested to suggest the names of persons for such employment at the June, 1900, annual meeting.

4. We recommend that \$250 be appropriated for the maintenance of the musical department, the same to be expended under the supervision of the president of the University.

5. We recommend that the proposition of the Eugene Water Company to furnish water to the University for the coming year at a flat rate of \$500, or at a rate of 12 cents per 1000 gallons, be not accepted.

6. We further recommend that the suggestions of the president of the University touching the re-organization of the University and the faculty be adopted.

A resolution was then passed to the effect that the officers of the board be elected at the June meeting annually.

The board then adjourned, subject to call by the president.

OUR NEIGHBOR.

Judge Barton Tells How Linn County Court House was Erected.

AND HE'S A POPULIST.

We take the following from the Albany Democrat:

TO THE PEOPLE: Believing it is the duty of those charged with the expending of public funds to make an accounting to the taxpayers of such expenditure, therefore on behalf of the county court I hereby submit a statement of substantially the cost of the new court house.

A contract was entered into for its rebuilding under plans and specifications approved by the county court for the sum of \$14,775.

Changes were made from plans during construction in several particulars and the increased cost of these changes together with the purchase of furniture, fixtures, painting, clock, etc., is as follows:

Change from wooden to steel	\$14,775 00
roof.....	325 00
Vault doors, frames, etc.....	400 00
Painting.....	100 00
Window shades.....	200 00
Clock complete.....	500 00
Commission as per contract to architect for plans, specifications, and of personal supervision.....	600 00
Furniture and incidentals.....	300 00
Total.....	\$17,600 00

The present building should accommodate the county with room to transact the public business for the next forty years at least, with the only expense of occasional painting. Every official has a well lighted, ventilated room. Building heated throughout with a hot water system, radiators in every room. Five large fireproof vaults. The circuit court has a seating capacity of over 300; two large spacious jury rooms, witness room and a circuit court library. Last but not by any means the least, is a fine 8 day Seth Thomas clock, located 100 feet high in the large tower, and it strikes out the merry chimes hourly on the magnificent 1200 pound bell donated to the county by the city of Albany.

There are many people in whose judgement this building compares favorably with any court house in the valley. There is also one feature of its building in which the court, in common with all other people, take much satisfaction, and that is that every dollar of its construction is paid for, and that out of the levy of 1898, and not one warrant stamped, nor one cent of interest paid by the county.

I will submit the cost of purchase of the poor-farm and erecting of its substantial building next week.
