A SOLDIER'S GRAVE.

War has its glory, but there is no lack of the pathetic. The latter, like the incident of yesterday in the Eugene I. O. O. F. cemetery, is only for a day and is then forgotten except by a few sad hearts that treasure the memory of their dead. The private and the general are laid to rest and find equality in the grave. At the nation's capital, Saturday, the remains of General Lawton were laid at rest in the Arlington cemetery. The Associated Press gives a realistic account of the last tribute rendered the dead general:

A dozen troopers, as the doctor closed, lifted the flower-laden coffin and bore it to the door, where 3000 soldiers and citizens in greater numbers waited to honor the soldier in his last march to his final resting place on the Virginia hillsides, beyond the Potomac.

With a clatter of iron hoofs, the cavalry escort cantered forward to form the guard of honor. Orders flung from rank to rank down the broad avenue brought troop and platoon wheeling into line. With crape shrouded colors lowered, they filed past—scarlet-capped artillerymen, cavalrymen with their orange plumes and facings, and the ranks of blue-clad infantry moving with machine like cadence. At the rear, with rumble of heavy wheels and clash of trace chains came the guns, flat batteries and siege trains.

Ahead of the scores of carriages was the flag-draped, flower-laden caisson, the ideal soldier's bier, and behind it was the officer's charger, in a shroud of black, with the boots reversed in the stirrups, a picturesque remnant of superstition in this materialistic day of machine guns and smokeless powder.

THE BALLOON IN WAR.

The balloon was first used for war reconnoitering purposes during the siege of Paris by the beleaguered Frenchmen who thus observed the position of the German command. A Sunday dispatch told how the balloon service saved slaughter of British troops in the Boer campaign.

According to this dispatch, a balloonist on Wednesday discovered the fact that the Boers had developed extraordinary and unexpected military strength on Doorn Kloof, where they had managed to draw up a dozen guns. These, but for the balloonist, would never have

been discovered in time to save the British from falling into a deadly trap, as they commanded the road in order to reach Ladysmith. These guns rendered the actual positions of the British untenable, and a further advance impossible except at a cost of a terrible and useless loss of life.
