Even the advice not to climb over the back of the dining room chair is not considered superfluous. Here is how the Salem paper talks to the belles and dames of the capital city.

Ladies may in time know how to vote. But not all know how to get into and out of a chair at a table. Never climb over the back of a chair. Never grasp both sides of the back at once, and standing in front of it in a half sitting posture, "hitch" the chair into place. This is decidedly awkward and vulgar. Go about it deliberately. The Union Scout has a correspondent who is visiting his old home in Iowa. He has this to say about liquor traffic in that prohibition state:

We learn new things every day and night. One of the persistent efforts of the prohibition class to keep whiskey out of Iowa, and the other class to forever keep it here, and the latter crowd seem to crown their efforts with howling success. If the tippler wanted an egg to go with the beverage he could buy it for seventy-five cents, \$9 a dozen. There is no crying need for prohibition laws in Ladysmith.
