COUNTY FINANCES.

The official figures of the expenditures of Lane county during the past four years are a revelation to the average voter, who pays little if any attention to county financial affairs. As it is difficult for the average citizen to compare figures we summarize a few facts:

Under the mixed political board of the first half of 1896, with Judge Fisk at the head, county expenditures for the year ending September 30, 1896, were \$29,685.80 and the tax levy was 15 mills. Indebtedness, \$22,180.38.

A year later, September 30, 1897, the indebtedness had increased to \$61,283.84, and the levy to 17 mills. The next year 20 mills were required, yet the debt bounced to \$89,075.48.

The county court evidently got alarmed and thought to wipe out some of this indebtedness for they have levied a 23 mill tax for 1899. On September 30 of that year the indebtedness stood at \$88,520.06, a reduction of \$555.42 from that of the preceding year.

Notwithstanding the heavy increase of the rate of taxation the county debt has grown from \$22,180.38 in 1896 to \$118,000, as nearly as it may be estimated, at the present time.

The building of the courthouse, with furniture cost, as nearly as may be ascertained, \$74,618. Deduct that amount from the total of the years 1897-8-9, \$228,879.38, and we have \$154,261.38 as the amount of the ordinary county expenditures for those three years, or an average of \$51,420.46 as against \$29,685.80 for the last year of Judge Fisk's term.

And this is not all. The indebtedness has increased from \$22,000 to \$118,000, an average of \$32,000 a year, the indebtedness increase alone being two thousand dollars a year more than the entire amount expended by the county during the last year of Judge Fisk's term.

These are figures from official statements and sources. They must make the taxpayer pause and inquire if there is not some remedy by which Lane county may be freed from debt, and her taxes reduced to normal limits. We have but one suggestion. The man in private life who has taken his business affairs out of the charge of a careful employee and placed it in charge of those who had involved him in debt and large financial loss, on learning the true state of his affairs would discharge the extravagant agents and re-employ the one who had managed his interests faithfully and profitably.
