MR. EAKIN ON THE LOCAL FINANCIAL SENTIMENT.

Hon. S. B. Eakin is of the opinion that gold standard sentiment is growing stronger in Lane county. Mr. Eakin is first vice president of the First National bank of Eugene. On the 13th day of February, 1900, the First National made a report of the condition of its business up to and including that day, legal publication of which was made in the DAILY GUARD of February 20.

That statement showed resources of \$675,431.51, and loans and discounts of \$188,346.14. Every dollar of those loans is made payable in gold coin of the United States. Is it to be wondered at that Mr. Eakin is for the gold standard?

In his letter to the Oregonian, which we published elsewhere, he says "money is easier among the farmers, although very many of them have not sold their wheat and hops." Mr. Eakin's position should give him the opportunity to form an unbiased opinion on financial matters, yet his allusion to wheat and hops gives cause for belief that he looks through the glasses of self interest, and only views the financial situation from a purely personal standpoint.

No one will question Mr. Eakin's prosperity. But how about the farmer and hopgrower? Wheat is the principal crop marketed by the farmer. Since the last harvest the price of that cereal has fluctuated from 38 to 42 cents a bushel, being quoted now, in Eugene, at forty cents. Mr. Eakin spent his boyhood days on a farm and knows the profits that accrue for farming. Would he be willing to step out of that bank and take the best wheat farm in Lane county at half rental and attempt to grow wheat at 40 cents a bushel? We think not. Mr. Eakin would stay with the bank and the gold standard. When Mr. Eakin farmed the grower got 75 cents to \$1 a bushel for wheat and the ground was virgin. With a steadily decreasing yield, and a 40 cent price, the farmer is not investing in government bonds. It takes all his money to pay taxes and living expenses.

His reference to the hopgrower is not less unfortunate than the allusion to the wheatgrower. At one

time, early in the season, when many of the growers had hardly gotten their products in the bale, a barely living price could have been secured. Since that time the price has hovered about the bare cost of production, not counting returns on investments. Growers who did not sell on the first market, and have since been compelled to dispose of their holdings, barely got out even.

The people will be very careful about unreservedly accepting Mr. Eakin's opinion about the gold standard and gold standard prosperity.

THE EDITOR WILL BE THERE.
