The recent rise in the river was but slight, says the Portland Telegram of February 27, and the water has again subsided about to its usual winter stage. It stands about eight feet above low water mark. The rains early last week in the Willamette Valley caused the river to rise rapidly at Eugene, Albany, Salem and other points up the valley, and it came up some five feet here. The rise was but temporary, and the water fell as rapidly as it had risen.

LENTEN SEASON.

Begins With Today, Ash Wednesday.

"Now when at length the pleasant time of Shrove tide comes in place, And cruel fasting days-days at hand approach with solemn grace; Then old and young are both as mad as ghouls of Bacchus' feast, And four days long they tattle square and feeds and never rest."

Lent will begin today with Ash Wednesday. Yesterday was Pancake Tuesday, or Shrove-tide. The following curious account of the day appears in a book published in 1620:

"Shrove Tuesday, at whose entrance in the morning, all the whole kingdom is unquiet, but by that time the clock strikes 11 which (by the help of the knavish sexton) is commonly before nine, then there is a bell rung, call'd the Pancake bell, the sound whereof makes thousands of people distracted, and forgetful either of manners or humanity; then there is a thing called wheaten flour, which the cooks do mingle with water, eggs, spices and other magical, tragical enchantments and then they put it by little and little into a frying-pan of boiling suit, where it makes a confused, dismal hissing (like the Lernean Snakes in the reeds of Acheron, Slix or Phlegeston), until at last, by the skill of the cook, it is transformed into the form of a Flap-jack, call'd a Pancake, which ominous incantation the ignorant people do devote very greedily."

Shrove-tide was formerly a season of extraordinary sport and feasting. In the Romish Church there was anciently a feast immediately preceding Lent, which lasted many days, called Carnivalescapum. The following quaint description of Shrove Tuesday is found in the Vox Graculi, 1623:

"Here must enter that waddling, straddling Carnivales of all Christendom, vulgarly entitled Shrove Tuesday, but more pertinently, sole Monarch of the Mouth, first Favourite to the Frying-pan, Protector of the Pancake, first Founder of the Fritters, etc. This corpulent commander of those choleric things called Cooks, will shew himself to be but of ignoble education, for by his manners you may find him better fed than taught wherever he comes."

Ash Wednesday takes its name from the ancient custom of blessing ashes on that day, the ashes used being made of the palm fronds consecrated on Sunday, 12 months before. According to the Benedictine rule, on Ash Wednesday the monks returned to the cloister to converse, but at the ringing of the bell were instantly silent. They were supposed to unshoe themselves, wash their heads and make one common prayer, this to follow a religious service. The priest having consecrated the ashes and sprinkled holy water on them, threw them on the heads of the monks, saying, "remember that you are but dust, and to dust must return."
