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THE DANIELSON ASHORE.

Went On the Sands at Siuslaw Her Cable Parted.

The Florence West of March 2 has this account of the accident that befell the schooner Danielson while being towed into the Siuslaw river:

"Last Saturday morning the steamer Roberts went out across the Siuslaw bar to pick up the schooner Danielson with the intention of towing her into the river. There was a short kink in the schooner's wire cable, to which the tug's hawser was attached and about the time the Danielson reached the first breaker the strain on the cable caused it to part leaving the schooner helpless for the moment. Her sails were quickly spread and efforts made to guide her into the river, but as there was very little wind the vessel drifted on the beach inside the bar.

"The Roberts being unable to aid the Danielson, made another trip out (over and brought in the Del Norte. She then went to Florence and Aome and took down a crew of men to take off the freight from the schooner, but on arriving there it was deemed unnecessary to unload the vessel as everything seemed to be safe.

"A message was sent to the Umpqua life saving station and Captain Bergman and crew arrived Sunday afternoon to assist in getting the vessel afloat.

"The schooner is being worked along on high tide toward the channel and will probably get off safely tomorrow."

School Clerks' Salaries.

DEAR SIR:—According to circular letter No. 9, school clerks are not allowed by law to use any of the common school fund for salaries.

This decision was given in order to give you a working basis to disallow the exorbitant salaries to school clerks which has been the practice, in some districts, in the past. However, I would suggest that it might be as well to allow school clerks a nominal sum for their salaries; enough at least to cover the ordinary expenses, such as postage, stationery, etc., and perhaps a small sum for their services.

Professor Thomas Condon

THE MUSICAL CLUB RECITAL

PROFESSOR CONDON HONORED.

The University of Oregon honored Professor Thomas Condon this morning by a special assembly. Professor Condon has just passed the 78th mile stone of life, and the faculty found occasion at this time to present to him a fine chair, while the student body contributed to the event a gold inkstand and gold pen. The affair was in the nature of a surprise, but was not the less pleasant on that account.

After the opening exercises and a song by the Faculty Quartet, President Strong made the presentation address on behalf of the faculty.

"During the 78 years Professor Condon has lived," President Strong said, "the greatest advancement the world has known, has occurred. The invention and progress of railroads, steamboats, telegraph, educational advancement, invention, the building of factories and advanced growth of cities all come within the life of Professor Condon."

"I hope that Professor Condon will live another 78 years," continued the speaker. "That is not a long time—only 156 years. Yet many people would not be able to accomplish in the 156 years, for the upbuilding of character and the advancement of the world, what Professor Condon has accomplished in our fortyth time."

On behalf of the faculty President Strong then presented to the venerable professor the chair.

On behalf of the student body C. N. McArthur presented the inkstand and pen, taking advantage of the occasion to express the beloved instructor's sincere appreciation of his labors for the student.

Professor Condon, in responding, was deeply moved by these material evidences of the devotion of students and respect of co-workers.

"The character of the young people coming under my instruction during the past 78 years forms the evidence of substantial greatness and nobility for the Oregon of the future, and its educational advancement."

Judge J. J. Walton made a few brief remarks on the early history of the University,
