CHICAGO SKY-SCRAPERS.

E. Hofer, of the Salem Journal, is traveling in the east. From Chicago he writes an entertaining letter to his paper, from which we take the following interesting extract descriptive of the high buildings for which the "Windy City" is famous:

The high buildings of Chicago are a source of constant interest to a visitor. They are landmarks to find your way about the city. Some of the old and some of the new buildings are quite roomy and tall, and impressive as you wander up and down from the basement to the barbershop under the roof. But they dwindle when you go shooting up into a sky-piercer like the Masonic temple or the Schiller building. Many of these buildings are called fire-proof, but strictly speaking there is no such thing unless there were a whole city full, and then it is not certain there might not be conditions making a conflagration possible. I saw some hot fire in the city. They seldom put them out in time to save the building, the whole fight being to save lives and keep the flames from spreading. More firemen lost their lives while I was in the city than citizens.

One of these fires in the business district gutted an old factory building that stood along side of one of these new fireproofs about twice as high. As the heat increased I noticed the crowd grew more excited on the street. The iron shutters of the wall of the high new building next to the fire began to smoke and curl. Then the glass began to crack out of the windows. A draft was started up through the six or seven stories of the skyscraper of brick and metal. Soon the flames broke out of the roof. What they fed on but the contents of the offices no one could tell. But as the building got hotter the steel floor beams and girders began to bend and writhe and twist like serpents in the flames, and in half an hour that magnificent structure with its twelve hundred offices was a heap of rubbish. It was more dangerous to life and other property than a common building, and seemed to go down quicker when it began to feel the crucible heat.

Put it out? Well the fire department might as well have squirted away at a quarter section of the infernal regions as try to put water on that fire-proof. It was fire-department-proof.

Bourke Cochran at New York said: "In his speech last night, President McKinley said there was no alliance with England. I be-

lieve that. It is not an alliance. It's a surrender; a surrender of the control of our foreign policy into the hands of the foreign office. We do not get anything. We give up, and the government discharges a consul at Pretoria because he complained that his mail had been opened. A boy 24 years old is put in his place, the son of our former ambassador, and more than that, he gets his last instruction, not from the government at Washington, but from the foreign office in London."

The world's production for that year is estimated at 2,670,000,000 bushels, of which the United States produced 597,294,000 bushels, being the largest producer. Russia came next with 374,431,000.
