Portland Telegram, rep.: "If, as reported, ex-Senator David B. Hill, Richard Croker, ex-Senator Edward Morphy and Judge Augustus Van Wyck should head the delegation from New York to the Democratic national convention, and should support, or not oppose, Bryan's nomination, and the platform adopted it would look as if New York was a very doubtful state next fall."

The tariff of 1789, proposed by Alexander Hamilton, provided for a duty of 8 cents per gallon upon importations of molasses. In the discussion of the bill a Massachusetts member of the house of representatives, wiser than many of his successors, arose and said:

"We up in Massachusetts do not want that duty upon molasses. We trade our fish for molasses, and if you shut out the molasses you will shut us out of our fish."

Jacksonville Times: Hon. H. B. Miller, formerly of Grant's Pass, now of Eugene, has been appointed consul at Chung King, China, and his appointment will doubtless be confirmed by the senate. The appointment is rather a tardy recognition of Mr. M. services to his party; but at the same time removes a possible congressional candidate from Mr. Tongue's path. Mr. T. is not taking any chances this year.

Is it not monstrous that the government of the United States should deliberately decree a vast addition to the profits of such a concern as the Carnegie company by imposing a tribute on any citizen who prefers to make his purchase from a foreign competitor of that company? Is there any sense in "protecting" the Carnegie steel company in the possession of its \$20,000,000 of annual profits by levying a fine upon anybody who does not wish to patronize it?

Representative Richardson, the Democratic leader in the house, has, by a new resolution, added the steel trust to the sugar trust, the paper, the tin trust, and the oil trust, the products of which previous resolutions authorize the Interstate Commerce Commission to prohibit the transportation of on Interstate Transportation lines whenever they have knowledge that the prices asked for the goods

produce profit in excess of 4 per cent on the actual capital invested in the trust which controls them.

Senator Butler, chairman of the Populist national committee, expresses the opinion that the attempt to create friction between the Democrats and Populists, will fail. Speaking of the nomination of Col. Bryan, Senator Butler said: "Bryan will be the choice of the three elements, the Democrats, the Populists and the Silver Republicans. The two latter will meet on the same day, if present arrangements are carried out, and will, in all probability unite upon the same candidate for vice president."

The Chicago Chronicle, acting upon the wisdom of the old saying that straw shows which way the wind blows, declares that "Mark Hanna has parted with his boggy, and when he presents himself this year, endeavoring to frighten Democrats in support of Mr. McKinley he will be laughed at." The Chronicle is one of the big democratic papers that supported Mr. McKinley for the presidency in 1896 and that is now trimming its sails to follow the democratic ship of state in the year 1900, and there are others who have awakened to the fact that "Mark Hanna has parted with his boggy."

Jacksonville Times: The miserable Puerto Ricans, upon whose little products a tariff is to be levied, in order to maintain the principle of protection, are to be fed and provided for, to the extent of three or four million dollars. The president has sent in a special message recommending that he be given \$2,000,000 for this purpose, in addition to \$1,500,000 surplus from the war revenue fund; that has been partly applied in this way. This message he doubtless calculates, will in some degree "take the curse off" his consent to the petty-larceny tariff bill that has just passed the house.
