PUBLIC ADDRESS.

To the Voters of Lane County,
Oregon.

In view of the approaching June election this seems to be a fitting time to call the attention of the citizens of this county to its local affairs. Never in the history of the county was there greater necessity for the citizens to unite, regardless of party, in the election of men who will curtail expenses and put down excessive taxation. The taxpayers were never so illy prepared to meet the demand.

Since the republican administration of county affairs commenced, four years ago, the rate of taxation has grown higher each succeeding year. The change has been so radical, the amounts collected and paid out so much in excess of four years ago, as to challenge the earnest attention of every voter. If you will but compare the official figures you cannot escape the conclusion that there have been great extravagance and useless waste of the public money. High taxes are not a blessing to any people and is not a welcome visitor to any home.

We find that in 1896 a tax levy of 15 mills raised a revenue sufficient to pay all the running expenses of the county, and a considerable sum on the county debt. In 1898 the tax levy was 20 mills, which raised a revenue of \$88,530, which was more than twice as large as in 1896, and yet this large sum was not sufficient to pay the extravagant expenditures of the county.

In 1897 the levy was 17 mills.
In 1898 the levy was 20 mills.
In 1899 the levy was 23 mills.

We ask the taxpayers to consider these figures.

With the low prices prevailing for the products of the farm, such a high rate of taxation presents a serious question for each voter to meet. Not only must we consider the low prices for the farm products, but we must look at the fact that almost all the farm implements and the necessities of life have increased from 25 to 100 per cent in the last year.

This high rate of taxation can be reduced by an honest and economical administration of the county affairs. This will not be done by the party in power, under the lash and rule of the party ring. We believe it to be of the highest importance for the welfare of the county, and the duty of each voter of whatever former party affiliation to place men in office who will reduce the tax levy and run the county affairs on an economical basis.

A fair and equitable assessment of all taxable property, and the very lowest tax levy consistent with efficient government, is our motto.

We therefore invite all voters, irrespective of party, to join us in this movement of retrenchment and reform.

WOODBIDGE GEARY

Funeral Will Be Held at 2
p. m. Tomorrow.

WILL BE MILITARY IN CHARACTER.

The remains of the late Captain Woodbridge Geary, Thirteenth U. S. Infantry, will be laid to rest tomorrow in the family vault at the Eugene Masonic cemetery. Captain Geary died in October in the Philippines of wounds received in battle, and the body has just arrived from that place. The following telegram received today is explanatory:

San Francisco, March 7, 1900.
Remains of the late Captain Woodbridge Geary, captain Thirteenth U. S. Infantry sent tonight at 6 o'clock by Wells, Fargo express.

LONG, Depot Quartermaster.
S. B. Eakin is attending to the necessary details here, pending the arrival of relatives. Mrs. Geary and children are in Corvallis, and will arrive tomorrow, together with Dr. E. J. Thompson, who will preach the funeral sermon, and a detail of O. A. C. cadets, where the late captain at one time acted as military instructor.

Dr. E. P. Geary, of Portland, and other relatives have been notified and will arrive in time to attend the funeral.
On the arrival of the body at 3:54 tomorrow morning, it will be turned over to the veterans of the Spanish war. The funeral will be military in character, from the time the guard of honor is placed over the remains until they are sounded.

The funeral will be held immediately on the arrival of the 2:08 overland tomorrow afternoon, to the Presbyterian church and from there to the cemetery. Friends of the family are respectfully invited to attend.

IN CIRCUIT COURT.

Verdict for S. P. Co.—Hugh Patterson is on Trial.

Roseburg Review, March 7.
In the circuit court of Douglas county today the case of the estate of Dick Quilhaug, deceased, against the S. P. Co. for \$5000, resulted in a verdict for the defendant, after the jury had deliberated for several hours. The suit was based upon the allegation that the neglect of the railroad company resulted in the death of Quilhaug, who was killed by a train in the Roseburg yards.

STATE VS. PATTERSON.

Hugh Patterson is now on trial for the crime of rape upon the person of Winnie Thorn, who is under the legal age of consent. Patterson is but 22 years of age, a son of George Patterson, a respected citizen of Albany, Oregon, and has heretofore borne a good reputation himself. He was working on a Southern Pacific freight train between Roseburg and Junction City when the alleged crime was committed. Another brakeman, Harvey, is held under the same charge, and the readers of the Review are familiar with the circumstances of the case, so far as they have been brought out in several preliminary examinations in connection with it.

The jury was completed at noon today after considerable difficulty.

After brief opening statements by the counsel, Miss Winnie Thorn, the prosecuting witness, was called.

The case will be hotly contested, one, District Attorney Brown and his deputy, Mr. Harris, of Eugene, representing the state, and L. Bilyeu, of Eugene, W. R. Bilyeu, of Albany, and J. H. Medley, of Cottage Grove, the defendant. The court room is crowded to its utmost capacity with spectators, who are seemingly much interested in the evidence.

Mr. Thorn makes a poor witness for the state, being slow to answer and quite frequently refusing to answer at all. She testified that Patterson overcame her by force, while in a box car, and tells of Harvey's connection with the case a good deal as she did at the preliminary in this city last Friday.
