ENGLAND DECLINES MEDIATION.

The British Government Will Settle her Own Scores With the South African Republic

Special to the Guard.

LONDON, March 13.—The answer of Prime Minister Salisbury to the offer of the United States government to mediate the differences between her majesty's government and the South African republics has been given to United States Minister Choate.

The British government declines the offer of mediation from this republic, though acknowledging the obligations conferred through the tender of our good offices.

WM. J. BRYAN

Will Speak at Albany and Salem
March 28.

WILL AROUSE THE NORTHWEST.

TACOMA, March 13.—The tour of the North Pacific states to be made by William Jennings Bryan includes addresses in the Willamette valley. As the dates are now arranged, the distinguished politician and orator will speak at both Albany and Salem on March 28. Notifications have been sent to these towns and it is expected that large and enthusiastic crowds will gather at each point, larger in fact than when Mr. Bryan spoke at Lebanon two years ago.

Cottage Grove Happy.

COTTAGE GROVE, Or., March 12.—A telegram was received here today from Roseburg announcing that the suit of G. G. Warner vs Bruneau & Jennings Bros. was decided in favor of the defendants. This was a suit to determine the ownership of the Helena mine, in the Bohemia mining district, which is probably the richest mine on the Pacific Coast. Ninety-five per cent of the people here are satisfied with the verdict. Bruneau & Jennings Bros. have run out 500 feet of tunnels, and have expended about \$12,000 in labor and machinery, and have at the present time \$200,000 in sight. The mill will be started at once, and it is estimated that \$10,000 will be the clean-up of the first 10-days' run.

Bryan Will Visit Portland.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 12.—Senator Turner, of Seattle, has received word from Colonel William J. Bryan that he would tour through Washington from March 28 to April 2, when he would go to Portland and speak there, and at other points in Oregon, before going into California. Senator Turner will accompany Bryan on his trip through Washington.

Bryan's Itinerary.

TACOMA, March 12.—Senator Turner wired today that Colonel Bryan will make five speeches in this state, as follows: Walla Walla, March 29; Spokane, March 30; Yakima, March 31, Seattle, April 2, and Tacoma, April 3.

WARNER VS. BRUNEAU.

The Big Bohemia Mining Case Was Won by the Defendants.

Roseburg Review, March 12. Shortly before 3 o'clock the jury brought in a verdict for the defendants (Bruneau, Jennings, et al.) after being out three hours. The attorneys for the plaintiff at once gave notice of a motion for a new trial, and were given until Thursday to do so. The Bohemia mining case of G. G. Warner et al. is now in the hands of the jury. The evidence was all in shortly before noon Saturday, and court was continued in session until far into the night that day in an attempt to give the case to the jury before Sunday. The arguments of the counsel were completed finally, but the instructions of the court were not delivered until this morning. These were quite lengthy and the counsel on both sides noted many exceptions to the law as laid down by the judge, thus laying the basis for an appeal, no matter which side secures the verdict.

Ebenezer Blachley.

The death of one of the oldest pioneers of Oregon and Lane county occurred today. Ebenezer Blachley died at the home of C. M. January, 11 miles north of this city, on the river road, at 8:30 this morning, of old age, aged 90 years, 3 months and 13 days. Deceased was well and favorably known, leaves three sons and one daughter and a host of other relatives and friends.

The funeral will be held at 1 o'clock tomorrow afternoon to the Eugene Masonic cemetery, Rev. Bell, of Junction, officiating.

MEDIATION.

Favorable Reply From Germany ---France Will Not Participate.

THE PLAQUE SITUATION.
