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WENDLING MILL.

Will Start Up Tomorrow Morning for Active Work.

75,000 FEET DAILY.

The large Wendling sawmill, located on Mill creek, in the Mohawk valley, and owned by the Booth, Kelly Co., will start up for active work tomorrow forenoon. The mill for a few weeks will cut about 75,000 feet per day, but will, in a few months, when the railroad is completed, saw about 120,000 feet daily.

The mill, when run to its full capacity, will cut 240,000 feet each 24 hours. The plant is fully equipped with dry houses and all the latest sawmill machinery known.

George H. Kelly will superintend this mill.

As in the other cases of like nature in the country, the mildness of the disease, together with the specific indications of the disease cause much diversity of opinion even among the medical profession.

PINK-EYE.

This Contagious Disease Among Horses in Eugene.

Pink-eye, a fatal contagious disease among horses, and one which has rarely been found in the Willamette valley, has made its appearance in Eugene. The animal afflicted is a mare belonging to J. S. Ham, who resides on North High street.

This morning Stock Inspector C. M. Young made a thorough examination of the diseased animal, pronounced the case malignant pink-eye, and established a strict quarantine. Every effort will be made to prevent a spread of the disease, which would be disastrous to horse-owners generally.

Speaking to a GUARD reporter this morning, Mr. Young said that he had proceeded as far as his authority extended, in establishing the quarantine, but that he had notified State Veterinarian Wm. McLean, of Portland, and that officer is expected up, in which case the animal will likely be ordered killed.
