Do not forget that before you can cast a vote at the coming state and presidential elections your name must be on the register. The time is now on to have your name put there. If not registered before May 15 you cannot vote. You can register before any notary public or justice of the peace free of cost, or at the courthouse in the county clerk's office. Do not neglect to register.

CARE OF THE EYES. Pacific Health Journal. Don't think because you have good eyes they will bear all kinds of abuse. Don't use the eyes continuously at close work without occasionally resting them by looking off in the distance. Don't hold the book nearer than is necessary for clear, sharp vision. Don't make a practice of reading type too small to be seen readily at 18 inches. Don't attempt to read in a car or other jolting vehicle. It is a strain on the directing muscles of the eye. Don't read while lying down. It causes an unusual strain on some of the external or directing muscles. Don't read when very sleepy, as the accommodation and convergence are naturally relaxed, and the extra effort necessary to force the unrelaxed members to work may be shown by a congestion of the blood vessels of the eyeball. Don't read facing the light. Don't read in the twilight or in badly lighted rooms.

The Texas Farm and Ranch does not believe that farming is chance work. It says: There is no enterprise upon which a man can embark his capital without an element of uncertainty attaching thereto. It is said that 80 per cent of people who undertake merchandising fail sooner or later. We have made note of the fact that farmers who put seed in the ground early, at the risk of a nipping frost now and then, are the men whose cribs are full of corn, whose granaries are bursting with grain, who drive fat horses and wear good clothes. The Scriptures tell us that "He that regardeth the clouds shall not reap." We may add as a commentary that the man who idly waits for spring is always at the tail end of the procession.

Don M. Dickinson, Cleveland's secretary of interior, is quoted by telegraph as being much disappointed over the platform adopted

by the recent Lincoln, Nebraska, Democratic convention. There does not seem to be any cause for Don's dissatisfaction. He publicly supported the gold standard Palmer ticket which ran as a McKinley adjunct in 1896, but probably was no exception to his kind and privately voted for McKinley. McKinley adherents are welcome to all the satisfaction they can get from quoting Dickinson's opinions.

The telegraph brings the news of a lecture in New York City the other evening by Rev. Bliss, Christian Scientist, in which he predicted the reelection of President McKinley. Still he is not optimistic, as is shown by the dispatch which concludes with this statement: At the same time, Mr. Bliss noticed a great feeling of unrest in the West, and he believed that the people were preparing for some great movement. The farmers were thoroughly tired of the trusts, as they were entirely at the trusts' mercy and had to buy and sell at the trusts' prices.

Andrew Carnegie's response in the Frick suit contains one paragraph that recalls the days of the Homestead strike and massacre. He says that one reason for the retirement of Mr. Frick from the firm was his "violent temper and ungovernable passion." It was Frick, it will be remembered, who led the fight against the working men, who organized the armed deputies, and who brought on civil war at Homestead. Frick is a typical trust magnate, and was one of the heaviest contributors to Mark Hanna's campaign fund.

The tobacco trust fears the competition of little Puerto Rico. Before long will come the Philippines, and their tobacco is both grown and manufactured into cigars. If the Philippines shall be admitted as part of the integral territory of the United States, every cigar factory in this country might as well shut up shop, while its proprietor can send what is left of his capital over to Manila, there to start a new plant, manned by cigar makers with wages of 6 cents a day.

The National Watchman is authority for the statement that "children born of white parents in the Philippine Islands rarely live more than six months. People will not live where they cannot raise families. This undoubtedly accounts for the fact that after three hundred and forty years of Spanish occupation the white population of the Philippines was less than ten thousand out of a total population of ten millions."
