## MCKINLEY IN A NEW ROLE.

Secretary of State Hay has submitted to congress the letters addressed to Great Britain, France, Germany, Russia, Italy and Japan regarding the rights of the United States to an "open door" in Chinese treaty ports. It must be humiliating for an administration that seeks to exclude the trade of the world from our shores, else taxes it with a tariff that in many instances means exclusion, to be compelled to go abroad and assert our claims to fair free trade with another country.

McKinley, apostle of high protection, says "you SHALL NOT trade with us, but we WILL trade with you." But decrepit China is about the only country that can thus be taken by the throat and compelled to accede to foreign demands regarding the administration of her domestic affairs.

## A PRESIDENT'S DILEMMA.

We have about seventy thousand troops in the Philippines. They have been there a year or more, and reports of sickness or debility show that they should be taken from the unhealthy tropical climate and replaced by fresh men.

The British have learned by experience that they cannot keep white troops in the tropics with safety for any prolonged period, even when not engaged in active campaigning. If so kept the efficiency of the troops rapidly deteriorates. And so, to keep up the efficiency of their troops, they have provided an elaborate system of reliefs so that no troops shall be called upon for continuous and prolonged service in the tropics. To this end they have established a permanent transport service ever

engaged in transferring troops from northern to tropical parts of the empire, and vice versa.

But where are the troops that can be sent out to relieve those now there? There are none. If the Philippine army is to be relieved a new army must be raised, congress will have to authorize an increase in our army, and the president call for more troops. And such a course would react unfavorably upon our colonial policy, hurt the chances of our president in this year's campaign. Therefore are these reports from the Philippines of ominous portent to the president. For if these reports be well founded, if he tells the country the truth, if he urges congress to authorize the raising of a new army to relieve that in the Philippines, and calls for more troops, he must cause men to turn from the policy he pursues, and from him. And if he fails to do this, keeps back the truth, fails to relieve the army now in the Philippines, the lives that may be sacrificed in the Philippines because of such failure, lives that might be saved if relief were sent, the old army repaced by a new, must be charged to his hands, his sacrifice of duty upon the altar of expediency.

British troops have found other enemies than the Boers in South Africa. The elements are arrayed against them. River beds that were dry for years have become raging torrents. The heavy rains cannot but be responsible for fever epidemic among the unseasoned soldiers.

That Wisconsin man who has outdone the court to be released from the payment of alimony to his divorced wife, who has married his father, is certainly entitled, in equity if not in law, to the relief asked for.
