## INDIAN DEVILTRY.

The editor of the Skagway, Alaska, Budget does not believe in "good Indians" except after careful interview. The issue from which the account of the brutal murder of Bert Horton and wife, published on another page, is taken said editorially:

Indians place a very small value on human life, possibly in many cases less than on the life of a good animal. So long as this estimate is applied to themselves, no one will enter a protest; but when worthless fish-eating Siwash take it into their heads to ruthlessly murder whites, it is time to hand the tribe their just deserts. Years of missionary work at the Mission has done but little for the Siwash except to sharpen his wits for civilized deviltry.

The Alaska Indian will follow a drum around all night and praise the Lord one minute, confess to cutting a throat the next, and be ready to fly to glory to the sound of balalaugh with his soul saved, but turn your back on him and he is the same "Injun" yet. If the old ones could all be sent to glory in a bunch, and the young ones brought up by themselves, the race might be improved.

## THE PRESIDENT'S PERSONAL HABITS.

It will no doubt surprise people that no less a body than a Methodist Episcopal church conference considered resolutions censuring President McKinley for public and private indulgence in intoxicating liquors, the resolutions being defeated by less than a two-thirds vote. The news comes in a Wilmington, Delaware, dispatch of March 27:

The Wilmington Methodist Episcopal conference, which represents Delaware and a portion of Maryland, today adopted a resolution

condemning the army canteen and the use and sale of liquors in our new possessions. The temperance committee also presented another resolution, which condemned President McKinley, as a member of the Methodist Episcopal church, for public and private tippling. It precipitated a hot discussion, and was finally defeated by a vote of 67 to 43. The resolution requesting the general conference to censure President McKinley for setting aside the anti-canteen law, and to censure him for drinking liquor, was adopted after the personal reference to the president's drinking had been stricken out.

## UNION AND REPUBLICAN.

The Albany Democrat makes this comparison of Union and Republican county administrations: It costs \$79,000 a year to run Marion county, and \$35,000 to run Linn county. Under the present economical administration the affairs of the county have been kept in splendid condition, the roads and bridges being kept up and general improvements having been made with a special effort in progress for giving the county the best roads in the state.

Linn county has a Union party administration. Marion county is solidly Republican.

Bob Ingersoll told the following: "I have found the cares which come to a man in a high place are enormous. After Garfield was nominated I said to him: 'Garfield, you are going to be elected, I hope, but by the time you have been president a month you'll wish you were running an ice-house in Hades.'"

"I saw him after he had been president while, and I said: 'Well, Garfield, how does it go?' "I don't know but I prefer the ice-house business," he replied."

There are some favorite sons among Republicans this year. Linn county Republican delegates are solid for Judge Hewitt for congress, Jackson is solid for Speaker Carter, Marion for Claude Gatch, Clackamas for Geo. Brownell, Benton for John D. Daly, and Washington for Tongue.

Linn county Republicans are not a whit behind those of Lane county. They also have a boss. A Mr. Hardman does the Croker-Hanna act for our northern neighbor Republicans. Occasionally, though, county delegates smash the slates of the town bosses and throw dust or mud, according to the season of the year, in their faces.

## AMERICAN COAL IN JAPAN

Consul Fuzita Says It Establishes a New Commercial Precedent.

CHICAGO, March 28.—T. Fuzita, Japanese consul in Chicago, speaking of advice he has just received from Japan, in which it is stated that the steamer Needles, carrying 6000 tons of coal from Virginia, had arrived at Nagasaki, said:

"This is the first shipment of American coal ever imported into Japan. It establishes a new commercial precedent between Japan and the United States. Though we have use for American coal, freight rates have been exorbitantly high against its importation."
