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ENGLAND APOLOGIZES.

Macrum Investigation Will Begin Soon and Will Be Public.

NEW YORK, March 27.—A special to the Journal and Advertiser from Washington says: The statement that England had apologized for the opening of Consul Macrum's mail in Pretoria was made by Secretary Hay to Representative Berry, of Kentucky, one of the democratic members of the House foreign affairs committee. Representative Berry called at the State Department today to talk over the charges made by Macrum, and it was during this interview that Secretary Hay made the confession.

"I saw Secretary Hay today," said Representative Berry in talking of the proposed hearing, "and he said that the whole groundwork of Mr. Macrum's charges rested upon the fact that three letters had been opened by British officials in South Africa. Secretary Hay said that England's attention had been called to this violation of international law and that Lord Salisbury had made an investigation and then had sent an apology to this country. The apology was delivered at the state department by Lord Pauncefoot."

"MR. AMIS: Will you kindly allow me space to say that D. R. Hill will not oppose Mr. Patterson for a place on the Citizens' ticket, though it be true an election to the office would be most acceptable through the school advantages a residence in Eugene would afford. But there are two very material reasons why Mr. Hill will not allow his name used.
