AX BILLY...**S. H. FRIENDLY.****THE HORTON TRAGEDY****A Detailed Account of the Brutal Murders.****MRS. HORTON'S THROAT CUT WHILE BEGGING MERCY.****Their Bodies Covered With Seaweed and Rock.**

By the courtesy of George M. Miller, of Skagway, Alaska, the GUARD is enabled to present very full particulars of the murder of Bert Horton and his wife by Alaskan Indians. The Skagway Daily Budget of March 16, has this account of the sad tragedy: "Last night the steamer Alert steamed in from the Mission with the first evidence of one of the most brutal crimes ever committed in any country. Marshal Tenner left in the morning, accompanied by a detail of regulars Commissioner Schibredre, W. A. Reid, R. S. Sluneger, F. M. Seesons, T. A. Fix, J. T. Dillon, M. J. Marovitz, A. J. Slaght and B. M. Woodridge; Dave Willard and Joe, Indian interpreters, and Jim Hanson, the Indian who confessed to the murder of Bert Horton and his young wife. Their purpose was to recover the body of the murdered pair.

THE FINDING OF THE BODIES. "The Indian Hanson was cool and indifferent throughout, conducting the party to the spot where the bodies were covered with snow and ice, with almost unerring precision, and they were uncovered with but little trouble. The remains were found beneath six feet of snow and ice in a little rift made by the action of the tide, where, after the crime, the red devils had laid the unfortunate couple, wrapping their bodies in blankets, covering them with canvas and seaweed, and weighting the whole down with rocks.

Horton was laid face down with his head resting on his wife's shoulder, who had been laid on her back. The bodies though not frozen were but slightly decomposed. Horton's body showed evidence of immediate death as Hanson pointed out the spot where they both stood at the time of the deed, and the murderer was but 12 feet from his victim.

Mrs. Horton was shot at a distance of about 150 feet by Kitchiku, and the bullet falling in its work, the flends finished their heinous work by stabbing her in the right side of the neck, and afterward by cutting her throat.

THE MURDER COMMITTED OCTOBER 14

"As stated yesterday, the Indian party came across Mr and Mrs Horton camping out in October, and yesterday it was learned that the approximate date was the 14th of that month. Then it was the deed was committed without any cause, except that two of the natives were missing, and the lives of the unsuspecting couple were sacrificed according to the heathenish custom of a life for a life.

"The bodies were taken to the morgue and will be prepared for burial. "The confessed murderer is stoical and indifferent, and no doubt now that

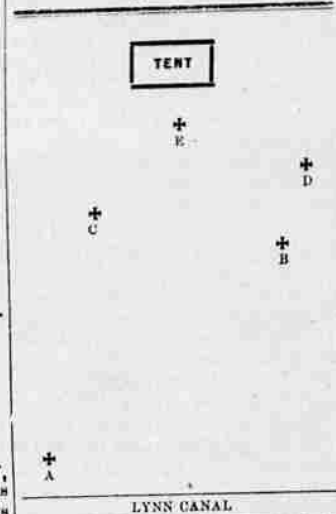
