WEATHER BUREAU

(Daily Report)
PORTLAND, OREGON, (April 3, 1900-9:30 a.m.)
Weather forecast for Eugene, Oregon:
Tonight and Wednesday: Fair; possibly light frost Wednesday.

If not registered before May 15 you cannot vote. You can register before any notary public or justice of the peace free of cost, or at the courthouse in the county clerk's office. Do not neglect to register.

EAST INDIAN FAMINE AND PLAGUE

One of the famines that at no rare intervals devastates Great Britain's East Indian possessions is now raging, accompanied by disease that ever follows in the wake of famine. A recent correspondence describes the terrible situation:

"When I left Bombay there was fearful suffering from the bubonic plague and famine. In the presidency of Bombay where I last resided, during the month of January, there were 3,000 deaths weekly in excess of the usual mortality rate. This was due to the plague. The English authorities at first attempted to fight it, but have at last been practically compelled to give it up and permit it to run its course. They have made feeble efforts at segregation, but owing to the conditions prevailing there, this has proven ineffectual. They will permit the disease to run its course of a few years, when it will die out. The result is horrible to contemplate, but there appears to be no help for it. There are bound to be thousands of deaths due to the dread scourge. It has been found that inoculation with plague virus is some protection against the disease. Vaccination is followed by a slight fever, less severe than that followed by vaccination for smallpox. This in some measure secures immunity from the disease for 90 days, after which the process must be repeated. The cause of the disease is a mystery. It first broke out in Bombay in the finest native residence portion of the city. Yet there is no danger of the disease ever permeating the United States. Our climate and cleanliness would

not permit it to flourish as it may in the oriental countries.

"Just now the famine is almost as serious as the plague. The vitality of the natives is rendered so weak by the famine that they cannot withstand the ravages of the plague and thus fall easy victims. Their only diet consists of a small quantity of rice. As I passed through a section of thickly populated country last January, I saw thousands of scantily clothed natives feebly walking about, hollow and gaunt, with their bones projecting. They were veritable living skeletons and the spectacle was pitiful in the extreme. Thousands literally starve to death. The famine always follows poor crops there, and is therefore by no means rare. It is primarily due to the improvidence of the natives, and also in part to the fact that the land is all in the control of the ryots (landlords), who take advantage of opportunities to corner the grain market and exact heavy rentals when a drouth occurs."

CLOSED MINES.

Before the Transvaal war Johannesburg, the metropolis of the South African Rand gold mining district, was one of the liveliest cities in the world. And no wonder, for the numerous mines poured unstinted treasure into her lap. A correspondence under date of February 9 tells how war has stopped the wheels of progress, and how the United States flag and government is recognized as a fair, impartial neutral:

"This vast mint, which before the war was grinding out money at the rate of a million dollars a day, has closed down indefinitely. But one hotel and a few small restaurants are open. Millionaires no longer loaf in the luxurious rooms of the Rand Club. Thanks to the special police, principally composed of Americans, perfect order is maintained and ample protection offered. No saloons are permitted to keep open. The same wise precaution is enforced in Pretoria.

"A striking feature of Johannesburg at present is the large number of United States flags displayed. The Stars and Stripes wave everywhere, even above many Kaffir kraals in the suburbs. Apparently Uncle Sam has a few black citizens in South Africa he has never heard of."
