William J. Bryan has a wonderful hold on the plain common people of the country. The crowd that thronged Eugene today to see and hear the silver and anti-trust champion was sufficient demonstration of his popularity.

The cause of his deep hold on the citizens of this republic is of easy determination. He says that less than a billion dollars of gold, held mainly in large capital, should not be made the basis of the nearly three billion dollars of money of the country. That trusts and combinations should not be allowed to rob the toiler of his hard earned wage.

THE ROYAL FAMILY ON KRUGER.

An interesting item appears in a London periodical called the Gem, giving the opinions of the royal family on President Kruger, culled from an album belonging to the Duchess of Fife. The Prince of Wales wrote:

"Mr. Kruger is a good judge of tobacco, and a bad judge of the English people."

The Duke of Cambridge wrote: "I am an old man and so is Kruger. As he is, so am I, an old soldier. I have so many faults myself, how can I judge another?"

The Queen wrote: "May God guide him and all of us out of our troubles and difficulties."

The Sound Money League has decided to continue its organization during the coming presidential campaign. The League represents nothing but banking interests that would make the \$867,000,000 of our coined gold the basis of a total of \$2,664,000,000. That is to say that less than one-third of our

money should be the only kind to which our government should give full recognition. That is "sound money" with a vengeance. It would be a good thing for the owners of "sound money," but not for the people.

Episcopalians will find an increase of about 20 per cent in the price of two books which have been guides to their devotion. The increase is said to be due to the high prices maintained by the paper trust. The price of the books, the Episcopal church book of common prayer and the hymnal, has been increased by agreement among the principal publishers. Twenty cents is asked for the prayer book instead of 15, and 25 cents for the hymnal instead of 20.

None can say now that imperialism will be the one predominant, overshadowing issue of the campaign of 1900. But it is the issue of this moment. It is a practical issue, a sentimental issue if you will—all three. It effects the pockets, appeals to the reason and touches the hearts of all men. It will not down, for in it is involved the fundamental principles of American liberty and the existence of the republic itself.

Eugene Republican candidates for office got black eyes yesterday. Here is the Register comment:

The delegates who came from the mountains smelling of balsam, and from St. Louis with the odor of salmon upon them, as one delegate put it, knew how to capture most of the candidates for office. Eugene succeeded in getting a candidate for representative and by timely effort captured the coroner.

It is a notable fact that one man, John D. Rockefeller, owns a majority of the stock of the Standard Oil company. His personal profits from this project alone are more than \$10,000,000 for three months, or \$40,000,000 per year. To this is added his profits in salt, zinc, copper, iron, gas, lake shipping and other enterprises of indefinite amount.
