If not registered before May 15 you cannot vote. You can register before any notary public or justice of the peace free of cost, or at the courthouse in the county clerk's office. Do not neglect to register.

The people respect Bryan for the enemies he has made.—The trusts and monopolies.

The Republicans of Lane county have nominated a McBride-Mitchell legislative ticket.

Who says there is not something in a name? A Mr. Dewey has been nominated for sheriff of Douglas county on the Union ticket.

The world has never witnessed finer patriotism than that displayed by the Boers. Even the women take their place in the trenches and fight to the death.

Queen Victoria has granted Ireland a great favor. She has decided that a great-grandson who has just entered the world shall be christened "Patrick."

Albert Michaud was hung at Tacoma yesterday for the murder of his wife whom he claimed was untrue. On the scaffold Michaud appeared resigned to his fate and made the following strange statement: "All I want to say is, after a murder, the best method is capital punishment. I have committed many errors and my hair is very gray, but I have good solid reason to have gray hair. That is all. Good bye."

Woodburn has just had a city election, license and anti-license being the issue. The former carried by forty-six majority, which led the Independent, the Woodburn paper, to sagely moralize:

The result was somewhat of a surprise to all, 46 majority being more than any of the most confident license men anticipated. It indicated that some of the temperance and church element slyly slipped in a ballot for the saloons in order to escape taxation.

China has refused Russia permission to build a railroad across her territory. Of course Russia

A prominent manufacturer of Pittsburgh says that the President and Mark Hanna are alarmed, and have begun a movement that may cause a cessation of hostilities between Andrew Carnegie and Mr. Frick until after election at least.

The attorneys representing millionaire senator-elect Clark of Montana in his effort to force a way to a seat in the United States senate declare the contention that Clark purchased his election is ridiculous. Of course when two multi-millionaires were contending for the seat in a broad open state like Montana there could be no corruption. Those legislators should be framed in glass cases and exhibited over the country as examples of money proof patriots.

Here is how Bryan was received at Roseburg on the evening of the day of his Eugene speech:

Not by hundreds* but by thousands did the people of Douglas county greet Hon. Wm. J. Bryan in his arrival at Roseburg last evening. The explosion of powder and the music of the band added to the enthusiastic acclaim with which the great leader was met on alighting from the train. With considerable difficulty he was conducted through the throng to a carriage and then to the hotel. He was dressed in a suit of dark blue, with a white shirt and a white necktie. He was accompanied by his wife and two children. The crowd was estimated at 8,000 or 9,000 people who had assembled there.
