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BEET SUGAR FACTORY

Willamette Valley Has Opportunity to Secure One.

EUGENE THE FAVORED PLACE.

The following letter from Dr. Karl G. Korn, of Dayton, Ohio, is self-explanatory. Mr. Korn was in Eugene about two months ago looking into the matter, and remained here about 12 days, inspecting sites, and studying the soil regarding its adaptation to sugar beet raising:

DAYTON, O., April 5, 1900.

DEAR SIR:—I herewith recommend your locality as well adapted for the cultivation of the sugar beet and the erection of a sugar factory.

The sugar company, which Hollis Cohen, esq., represents, asks a subscription of 5000 acres of land to be cultivated, surrounding Eugene; the factory site free of charge, and a bonus in the extent of \$100,000. The erection of such factory alone costs \$700,000, and its annual transaction amounts to about \$800,000, where nearly \$300,000 or more will be distributed direct to your farmers, and nearly \$100,000 will go direct to laboring men in the city, say nothing of the amount of other transactions done through such company.

The erection of a beet sugar factory means an opening and an establishing of a home market for your surrounding farming community, and a forerunner of various other agricultural industries, by which the farmer will realize large returns, and the merchants directly profited thereby.

Should you and your city be sufficiently interested to secure this plant, kindly notify D. Hollis Cohen, esq., and at the same time, I would ask to be favored with your decision, so as to put me in a position to help you as much as I can, as I am personally very much pleased with your city, and should like to locate in your midst.

To secure this plant would be more advantage to Lane county than the Siuslaw railroad, for which \$100,000 was raised several years ago. LaGrande raised a bonus of \$200,000 for a sugar factory there, smaller than this one as contemplated, and were glad of their privilege. Since the factory has been erected and placed in operation the people of that section unhesitatingly state that it is the largest and best thing to come to that entire portion of country.

This factory in contemplation will undoubtedly be erected some place in the Willamette valley, and it is flattering to Eugene to know this place is preferred to all others. This is an opportunity where Lane county has a chance to stand out pre-eminent and progressive in advance of the entire valley, and it should not be neglected. Every business man in Eugene should urge that the old Board of Trade be revived, and work with similar boards at Cottage Grove, Junction, Florence and other county towns to build up Lane county, secure this factory and make wealth producers out of the thousands of acres of rich lands which now bring in only indifferent returns.

EUGENE'S FIRST STEAMBOAT—Oregon City Herald:

"Jacob Wortman, president of the First National bank of McMinville, was visiting Hon. Wm. Galloway and Captain J. T. Apperson during the past week. Mr. Wortman is the pioneer steamboat man of the upper Willamette, having commenced to run boats on the river from the falls to Corvallis and Eugene, in 1853, and continued on the river until 1865. Mr. Wortman's first boat was the Oregon, which ran from Oregon City to Corvallis and Eugene. This boat was wrecked in 1854 below Salem. The fare at that time was \$30 from Oregon City to Corvallis." Mr. Wortman resided at Junction City for a number of years.

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CITY COUNCIL.

Mostly Routine Work—Annual Meeting April 10.

City Council met in regular session Monday night, present Ostrom, Roney, Abrams, Luckey, White, Haues, Ostrom chairman pro tem.

The usual number of bills were read and approved.

Recorder Dorris read the annual reports of the recorder, treasurer and the canvassing board on election returns.

Petition to grade and gravel the alley between Willamette and Oak streets from Seventh to Park street, on motion of Councilman Roney was referred to street committee.

Petition asking that Thirteenth street extending from Alder street to the east side of the U. of O. campus be improved by widening and grading and graveling same was referred to street committee.

Petition asking that a sidewalk be constructed on the west side of Lincoln street from the railroad track north to Third street was referred to street committee.

Ordinance No. 68, entitled "An Ordinance to regulate the keeping of stallions and jackasses within the corporate limits of the city of Eugene," was amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 2. The following district shall be exempt from the operation of this ordinance, to-wit: That portion of the city bounded by Ninth street on the south, the alley between Willamette and Olive streets on the east, the alley between Eighth and Ninth streets on the north and Olive street on the west; the said exemption being the southwest quarter of block No. 10 in Mulligan's donation to Eugene City."

The amendment passed unanimously.

Resignation of Drew Griffin as chief engineer of the fire department was read and on motion of Councilman Roney was ordered filed and the recorder was instructed to draw a warrant for the sum due Mr. Griffin.

Commissioner Scott submitted his monthly report of the amount of lumber used in making street improvements, which was 1496 feet.

The new councilmen were next sworn in.

On account of the absence of Mayor Harris the annual business meeting to have taken place Monday night was postponed till Monday evening, April 16th.

There being no further business, the council adjourned.
