THE DOBIE STEER.

One of the most notable exhibits that will represent Texas at the Paris exposition this year is the Dobie steer, which started on February 10th across the water to take its place in this great show. This steer, which belongs to Mr. J. M. Dobie, proprietor of the Kentucky ranch at Ramirez, Texas, goes by the name of Champion, but is known throughout the state as the Dobie steer. It was calved in 1891 near the Mexican border and was bought by Mr. Dobie in 1894 in a herd of 1000 cattle. It measures fifteen hands high, 60 inches, and weighs between 1800 and 1700 pounds. The horns measure from point to point nine feet and seven inches, and they could easily be made to measure ten feet if taken off the steer and steamed and straightened somewhat. When the steer is standing in a natural position on level

ground, the tips of his horns are fully six feet from the ground. While the Dobie steer in one sense represents Texas, in another it is no more representative of the present cattle interests of the state than the mammoth and mastodon are representative of the animals of this country. The long horn, of which the Dobie is an example, is a practically extinct as are the monsters of the Miocene period. Time was when long horns approaching those of this steer were common enough, but now one could travel all over Texas without finding another animal with a pair of horns like those. He is the last survivor of a tribe of monster horned cattle, whose place has been taken by better blood under the operation of the law of the survival of the fittest. And he goes to the Paris exposition, not as a specimen of the cattle now in Texas, but of those that formerly roamed in great herds over the prairies from the Red River to the Rio Grande.

According to Consul Skinner, reporting from Marseilles, France, the most common adulterant of olive oil is peanut oil, which is used because it is the most difficult to detect. It makes a good table oil alone, and for this purpose or for adulterating olive oil it brings higher prices than cottonseed oil. It is used in making counterfeit butter, as an illuminant, for lubrication and in the manufacture of soap. The art of mixing oils for various purposes has reached a high point of development among manufacturers, lubricants especially being compounded in all sorts of ways by different firms. The use of vegetable oils as substitutes for animal oils is rapidly increasing in all parts of the world.

Representative Champ Clark, of Missouri, thus states his position on the trust question: "It would be foolish for me to waste time making an anti-trust speech. The entire matter may be summed up in a single sentence. This is not a new issue. The first anti-trust speech was made about four thousand years ago by an old gentleman named Moses, when he wrote upon the tablets of stone the inspired words, 'Thou shalt not steal.'"
Wm. J. Bryan: We must distinguish between imperialism and expansion. Expansion means the extension of the limits of the republic. Imperialism is a policy of empire. We have expanded, we never had imperialism. We expanded when we took Florida, Texas and New Mexico, but we are not expanding now. We are not getting land for settlement; we are getting races for subjugation.

The apple industry is receiving no little attention in California. The Santa Clara Journal says that during the month of March 14,450 apple trees were received for planting in Santa Clara county, which shows a very healthy interest and marked increase in the number of apple trees being set out.
