A CREAMERYThe Co-operative Plan Has
Many Advantages.

IS GENERALLY SUCCESSFUL.

Folk County Observer: "Mr. John
G. Brown, who conducts a successful
dairy ranch two miles north of Dallas,
was in town Thursday, and expressed
himself greatly in favor of establishing
a creamery in or near this city. Mr.
Brown has given the dairy business a
practical test, and knows that there is
money in it. He manufactures an
average of 80 pounds of butter a week,
and finds a ready sale for his product
the year around at 20 cents per pound.
He says that there is good money in
selling milk to the creameries at the
prices prevailing."

"Mr. Brown is of the opinion that
the farmers should take the matter in
hand at once, and establish a creamery
to be conducted on the co-operative
plan. He has investigated the cost of
a plant suitable for this vicinity, and
finds no large sum of money will be
required to put in the necessary
machinery. His plan is to form a joint
stock company, with a capital stock of
from \$1,500 to \$2,500, divided into
shares of say \$25 each, then let each
farmer interested subscribe for as many
shares as he wishes to take, and agree
to furnish the milk of a certain number
of cows to the creamery. The next
step would be to employ a competent
man to take charge of the creamery
and superintend its operation. The
income from the business, less the cost
of operating expenses, would be dis-
tributed among the farmers in pay-
ment for the milk furnished."

The GUARD believes that the co-
operative creamery is the successful
one, and that working on this basis,
an effort should be made to establish
such a plant in Eugene. Out of 700
creameries in Wisconsin over 600 are
co-operative. Their success is sufficient
proof of business success.

A canvass, energetic work by a few
prominent farmers, together with
business men, a called meeting to
solicit stock to the enterprise, and the
thing is done. In this way the cream-
ery is not a one-man power, or
inexpedient of being changed or im-
proved to suit arising needs and conditions.
Should one superintendent prove
unsuitable or unsatisfactory it would
be easy to secure another and at the
same time add to the efficiency of the
establishment. An effort should be
made to establish a creamery in
Eugene this spring. It is badly
needed.

DANISH COLONYWill Locate in Lane County at
Once.

A GOOD CLASS OF CITIZENS.

"The start of the biggest enterprise
Lane county has ever seen is made,"
said E C Smith to a reporter this
morning, referring to the sale of his
large farm west of this city to a Danish
colony.

Mr Smith arrived home from Port-
land on the early train this morning,
having been successful in negotiating
the sale of 1280 acres of fine farming
land to a company or colonist organ-
ization of the Danish church. The
papers have been made out and the
advance payments issued.

Between the first and middle of May
the colonists will begin to arrive,
will select 40-acre tracts and at once
begin to build their homes. Others
are anxious to come, as fast as land
can be secured and other arrangements
made. Mr Smith states that other
tracts adjoining his have been spoken
for, and there is every probability that
the Danish colony will occupy from
5,000 to 10,000 acres of land in the
county in the next few years.

These people are rated among the
finest small farmers in the world.
They are familiar with tilling lands,
and every art which makes ground
productive. They are among the best
dairymen, and their little creameries,
producing butter and Dutch cheese
will be elements of interest. They will
raise poultry of all kinds, and make a
profit on it.

To the business community, the
addition of 200 or 300 families within
a small radius of the city will make a
marked change, for these farmers are
industrious and have money. They
