Do not neglect to register.

THE LEAD TRUST.

Geo. A. Macbeth, of Pittsburg, the greatest lamp chimney manufacturer in the world, is responsible for an exposure of the lead trust in which he shows that, thanks to the protective tariff, this trust get \$4.70 a hundred pounds in the American market for lead which sells at the same time in London for \$3.80. Here is a clearly defined tax of \$1.10 for every hundred pounds of lead consumed in the United States; and the tax is for the sole benefit of the lead trust. It amounts to an average of \$5,000,000 a year.

The re-election of President McKinley will give trusts a continuance of the opportunity to rob the public. The producer is being bled on every hand by tariff-trust beneficiaries.

The real issue is expansion or imperialism. To treat them (the Puerto Ricans) as citizens means to

make good the promise of General Miles and enforce the plain duty so beautifully set forth by the president in his message. To treat them as subjects means the violation of the promise of General Miles, the repudiation of the plain duty, and the substitution of imperialism for wholesome expansion. That is the issue as understood by the men who make and unmake presidents, and make and unmake senators.—Sandusky, O. Register [Rep.]

It is announced that Senator Hanna will not attend the next Republican convention, at least not as a delegate. He realizes that his presence would be detrimental to President McKinley.
