\$13,000 Damages and Costs of
Suit Awarded.THE SUPREME COURT AFFIRMS LOWER
COURT.

The decision of the lower court in
the Smitson case has been affirmed by
the Oregon supreme court and by this
decision Jennie Smitson receives
\$10,000 from the Southern Pacific,
together with the costs of action, for
the loss of both legs in a railroad
accident nearly two years ago.

This case is familiar to all Lane
county people. On July 23, 1897, Miss
Jennie Smitson, who was working in
the hotel at Eugene, took passage on
the Woodburn-Natron branch of the
Southern Pacific to Springfield to
visit her parents. The train, which
arrived at Springfield at 9 o'clock a-
night, stopped before reaching the
station, and the brakeman went with
the girl to the car platform to help her
alight. The train started up with a
jerk and in the darkness Miss Smitson
was thrown under the car wheels
which passed over both her legs,
rendering amputation necessary.

The case was taken up for Miss
Smitson by Attorneys Thompson &
Hardy and H D Norton of this city,
who carried it through the lower
court, securing a verdict of \$10,000 and
costs for plaintiff.

Attorneys Fenton and Muir, for the
company, then appealed the case to
the supreme court. The action for
damages was filed September 23, 1897;
was tried in the lower court October
30, 1897; the jury brought in the above
verdict November 3, 1897; a motion for
a new trial was denied February 5,
1898; the case was argued in the
supreme court February 13, 1900, by H
W Thompson and A C Woodcock,
(who succeeded Attorney Norton) for
Miss Smitson, and by Attorneys
Fenton and Muir for the Southern
Pacific Company; the decision of the
supreme court was filed today. The
company has 20 days in which to file a
motion for a rehearing.

This case has been stubbornly con-
tested during the time it has been
in the courts, and the attorneys who
have been successful in the suit are
deserving of the congratulations they
are receiving for its termination.

Miss Smitson, who has been most
unfortunate by this sad accident,
which rendered her a helpless cripple
for life, will be enabled to receive some
