RETORT TOO SMALL

Would Not Hold Clean-Up From the Lucky Boy.

WORK AT THE MINE.

LUCKY BOY MINE, Blue River, Or., April 16.—The 10-stamp mill of the Lucky Boy Company made its seventh regular clean-up today, and the retort would not hold it all at once. Everything here is going on smoothly and satisfactorily, as the returns are getting larger every month and the mill has run steadily day and night ever since its completion. But it will have to stop two or three days now, as a steam hoisting windlass is being put in to draw wood up from the canyon of Lucky Boy creek. The two tunnels where the ore is extracted for the mill, nearly 100 feet above, are both showing fine bodies of free gold rock, and two up-raises in ore are nearly made through to the surface from the upper tunnel. Next week an up-raise will be started to connect the two tunnels, and as soon as good weather shall come and the new sawmill gets started up, the main tunnel below will be enlarged and retimbered, and the work of stopping in all the three tunnels will begin. As the 12-foot ledge pays dividends right from the very surface, there are thousands of tons of pay ore already in sight, and the only drawback now is that the mill is entirely too small to make the showing it ought to make on this property at this time.

Springfield Meteor.

The people of our neighboring town of Springfield are still excited over the meteor that was seen to fall into the river bottom a short distance above the town Monday evening.

The meteor fell between six and seven o'clock, before the sun had gone down, and was observed by a number of persons whose accounts substantially coincide. It appeared to be about a foot in diameter and three feet long, fell at an angle of about 45 degrees, and did not move with noticeable swiftness. It passed very near the top of Thurston butte, south of Springfield, and appeared to fall in the near vicinity of the Neils boyard.

The alleged meteoric rock brought in for inspection was the work of practical jokers. If it was a solid interior no discovery of the place it struck the earth has yet been made.
