"LOAD" CHECKS.

The supreme court of Oregon has virtually decided that "load" checks given by wheat warehousemen entitle the holders to the same rights as if the final receipt had been given. That is that parole evidence was competent to show that wheat for which load checks were issued was received under the same contract and with the same understanding as wheat for which receipts were issued.

It seems to be an eminently sound decision. Otherwise the farmer who had all his wheat in the warehouse, excepting the last load, might lose his prorata of wheat in case of fire, or other incident calling for a distribution of wheat on hand.

A POLITICAL PARTNERSHIP.

The republicans must be under great obligations to their faithful allies, the mid-landers, says the Roseburg Review. The local organ gives two columns in a prominent

position to the doings of the eight or ten individuals who held an alleged state convention in Portland last week. It is already known that at least some of these few were sent there at the direct instance and expense of certain republican candidates for the purpose of doing everything possible toward disrupting the union forces and to nominate candidates for the purpose of drawing votes, if possible from the union nominees.

It is safe to say that every one who participated in the so-called convention will vote the republican ticket in June. Republican funds paid the mid-landers' campaign expenses two years ago, and they have begun again this year by employing a few unprincipled sore-heads to hold an alleged convention.

The editor of the Register is fast becoming a humorist. Read this from that paper and then weep: "Ivan McQueen knows the needs of Western Lane. Being well posted and formidable in debate he is amply qualified to hold his own with the best of them where Lane's interests are concerned." Lane county knows the man and will leave him at home by two or three hundred votes.

There are millions, if not billions of dollars in sight in the mines, and wholesale destruction would involve immense financial loss.

The Iron Age, the recognized authority of the steel and iron trade, says trade is suffering from over-production and that lower prices must prevail.

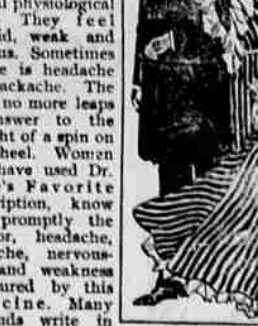
It seems early in the season, nevertheless the baseball circuit in the East opened yesterday. The circuit has been reduced from twelve to eight clubs.

Canada Will Repeal Law.

NEW YORK, April 18.—A Montreal dispatch says: Hon. Smith Currie, Minister of Mines in the British Columbia Cabinet, announces that the alien labor law which was passed by the British Columbia legislature at its last session, to exclude American miners from the Atlin district, will be repealed at the July session of the legislature.

To allow Americans to work placer mines in the meantime, the government has decided to grant free miners' certificates to companies incorporated under the laws of British Columbia. As the expense of incorporation is small, the Americans holding claims or deciding to do so, can follow out their inclinations with little more trouble than British subjects. After the law is repealed all will be on the same footing.
