State Supt. Ackerman and City Supt. Martindale. Albany. Visit the Schools.

Hon. J. H. Ackerman, state superintendent of public instruction, who has been visiting our schools yesterday and today, left on this afternoon's train for Harrisburg, where he is to lecture tonight. Tomorrow night he will lecture at Junction.

The gentleman expressed himself as very well pleased with his visit, both in the public schools and in the University. This morning at a special assembly he addressed the U. O. students, who enjoyed his practical and witty remarks. Superintendent Ackerman does not keep himself in the seclusion of his office, but gets out over the state, and keeps in close touch with the hard-working and faithful school teachers.

County Superintendent Miller accompanied Mr. Ackerman to Harrisburg today, and will conduct the institute at Junction tomorrow. Mr. Miller is also an example of the official who has come up through the ranks, can meet on the level with teachers, and has an intelligent appreciation of their trials and difficulties.

City Superintendent Martindale, of the Albany public schools, visited the high school this morning and addressed the students at assembly. He paid a very high compliment to the Cesar class, and in consequence they are feeling quite elated.

Mr. Martindale spoke on the advantages of physical development, and the desirability of encouraging student organizations for sport as well as for mental discipline. The gentleman also related some experiences of his while in London, England, and "pointed the moral" with telling effect.

The students were delighted with his talk and will be glad to welcome him again. Superintendent Martindale is a very affable man, and is recognized as one of the leading school men of our state.
